Australian Statement 4 July 2018

We thank the Panel members for their presentations.

Australia agrees that realising the 2030 Agenda's commitment to 'leave no-one behind' is intrinsically linked to dismantling discrimination, reducing inequalities, and addressing "the structural root causes that keep people in poverty, and that marginalize, exclude or discriminate against them in laws, policies and social practices". [A/HRC/38/28, para 32]

History has demonstrated that sustainable strategies for peace and development are inclusive approaches that respect and embrace global diversity and protect the universality of individual human rights. Conversely, exclusion is frequently a root cause of conflict, underdevelopment and human rights violations.

States should be supported in their efforts to both uphold their human rights obligations and implement the 2030 Agenda. Human rights technical cooperation and capacity-building can make a crucial contribution in this regard, particularly to ensuring that all peoples are included in, and benefit from, development.

Australia considers that National Human Right Institutions (NHRIs) are an integral part of this equation. NHRIs connect a state's international human rights commitments with its domestic realities and the lived experiences of individual rights holders and, in doing so, support the development and maintenance of inclusive societies, where human rights are protected and no one is excluded.

We would welcome the Panel's reflections on how states, or UN agencies, might engage with NHRIs to deepen technical cooperation and capacity-building that contributes to the implementation of the 2030 Agenda.
