Adventist Development & Relief Agency	<i>Relating Adults and Youth for Health II (READY II) -</i> The READY II project aims to improve the knowledge of students and ability of local authorities to run programs in adolescent sexual and reproductive health, substance abuse and other key life skills. The project is implemented in Cao Bang Town & Trung Khanh, Hoa An, Ha Quang, and Quang Uyen Districts, Cao Bang.	\$133,939
CARE Australia	<i>People Affected by Natural Disasters and Climate Change Program</i> - The program aims to enhance community adaptation and reduce vulnerability to climate change through developing and implementing innovative community-based adaptation measures identified through participatory analysis and planning processes. The initiative takes an integrated approach which combines traditional knowledge with innovative strategies to address current vulnerability and to build adaptive capacity to face new and dynamic challenges. Focused on vulnerable communes in the Mekong Delta.	\$168,750
CARE Australia	<i>Ethnic Minority Program: Ethnic Minority Women Empowerment for Better Livelihood and Nutrition Choices</i> – The objective of the program is to empower ethnic minority women in Vietnam to make their own choices on improved livelihoods and nutrition and have a respected and valued voice in influencing related policy. With a pilot in Bac Kan Province, the program will focus on livelihood and rights clubs, nutrition training, capacity strengthening, Village Savings and Loans Associations, and collaboration group for economic development, choices and action.	\$168,750
CARE Australia	<i>Socially Marginalised Program</i> – The program targets groups of people living in mostly urban settings who are denied multiple rights and live and work in unsafe environments, especially women. Sub-groups from this impact group are: people living with HIV, people who inject drugs, sexual minorities, sex workers and female migrants from rural areas seeking work in the formal and informal sectors. Activities focus on those who have low or no income, low or no employment skills, poor living conditions, are unregistered or temporary residents and are vulnerable to economic shocks.	\$393,750

World Vision Australia	<i>Strengthening Integration of Community-based Disaster Risk Reduction &amp; Climate Change Adaptation into Area Development Plans</i> – The program is helping communities in Tien Phuoc district (Quang Nam Province) and Son Tay district (Quang Ngai Province) to reduce vulnerability and negative socio-economic impacts of natural disasters by linking disaster preparedness with mitigation and climate change adaptation measures. Activities include establishing rapid response teams in disaster prone communes, strengthening the knowledge and skills of community-based rescue networks and helping communities to develop disaster preparedness action plans.	\$135,762
