Outcomes Summary: Afghanistan

This country report details the responses of alumni from **Afghanistan** to the Australia Awards Global Tracer Facility **Tracer Survey** carried out in 2018-19. The Tracer Survey was conducted between November 2018 and February 2019 and targeted **alumni who completed their award between 2011 and 2016**.

Alumni were asked a range of questions via an online survey, focussed on exploring the long-term outcomes of the Australia Awards. In total 3,768 alumni in this cohort from more than 123 different countries participated in the survey. A 26 per cent response rate of the target cohort was achieved globally. This report focuses on the response data of alumni from Afghanistan.

For Afghanistan, there were 83 alumni included in the target population. Responses were received from 17, a **response rate of 20 per cent**. Among these respondents, 10 were scholarship alumni and seven were fellowship alumni.

The survey data provide a valuable quantitative insight into alumni use of knowledge and skills, development of networks and contribution to cooperation with Australia. The responses also offer rich examples from alumni of the types of contributions they are making, the way in which they are using their award, and the things that help and hinder them in reaching their potential.

The data detailed here are reported based on the four long-term outcomes of the Australia Awards as articulated in the *Australia Awards Global Strategy: Investing in the next generation of global leaders for development 2016-2018* and the Australia Awards Global Monitoring and Evaluation Framework. In terms of responding to the **long-term outcomes** of the Australia Awards, the following summary offers findings based on the responses of alumni from Afghanistan. Further outcomes are included in the infographic following this summary.

Outcome 1: *Alumni are using their skills, knowledge and networks to contribute to sustainable development.*

- All alumni from Afghanistan indicated they have passed on their skills and knowledge to others in their country on return from their award.
- 94 per cent of alumni indicated they had introduced improved practices and innovations in their work on return from their award.

Outcome 2: *Alumni are contributing to cooperation between Australia and partner countries.*

- 38 per cent of alumni from Afghanistan have maintained frequent contact with fellow alumni, while 31 per cent have frequent contact with friends in Australia and 38 per cent with Australian students/alumni.
- In terms of frequent contact with Australian organisations, 25 per cent of alumni have frequent contact with Australian institutions and 13 per cent of alumni have frequent contact with Australian businesses.

Outcome 3: *Effective, mutually advantageous partnerships between institutions and businesses in Australia and partner countries.*

- 56 per cent of alumni from Afghanistan indicated having had a professional link with an Australian organisation at some time following award.
- These links were with Australian universities, the government sector and the private sector.

Outcome 4: *Alumni view Australia, Australians and Australian expertise positively.*

- All alumni from Afghanistan indicated their experience in Australia positively influenced their perception of Australia.
- Most alumni (88 per cent) have provided advice to people in Afghanistan about pursuing opportunities in Australia.

The Tracer Survey represented the views of a range of alumni from Afghanistan. Of those who responded, **24 per cent were women and 88 per cent came from an urban location**. The largest age group represented were alumni 40 to 49 years. Among all alumni, 94 per cent were employed full-time. Of those alumni employed, **81 per cent** indicated that they hold a **formal leadership role**.

The data tables correspond to each of the Australia Awards long-term outcomes and include benchmark data from the entire survey response population.







I have transferred my knowledge to our trainers and supervisors by conducting training courses. Then, our trainers and supervisors replicated the training to health providers at the health facility level. More than 100 medical doctors and nurses received this training.

I establish a linkage between the Health Facility staff and patients (children aged under 5). This approach enables us to increase awareness of vaccination, nutrition, hygiene and the prevention of communicable disease.

I made a lot of friends in Australia from universities, colleges, private and government companies and social enterprises where I met people of different social, political and professional background. I learned great skills and knowledge from everyone in Australia. It helped me a lot in achieving my professional and social goals. I convey the skills and knowledge to fellow Afghans through electronic communications and face to face meetings here in Australia and within Afghanistan. I welcome any opportunity to work in Afghanistan and help others benefit from my knowledge and skills that I learned throughout my life, especially in Australia.
