Tracer Survey Outcomes Summary: Solomon Islands

This country report details the responses of alumni from **Solomon Islands** to the Australia Awards Global Tracer Facility **Tracer Survey** carried out in 2018-19. The Tracer Survey was conducted between November 2018 and February 2019 and targeted **alumni who completed their award between 2011 and 2016**.

Alumni were asked a range of questions via an online survey, focussed on exploring the long-term outcomes of the Australia Awards. In total 3,768 alumni in this cohort from more than 123 different countries participated in the survey. A 26 per cent response rate of the target cohort was achieved globally. This report focuses on the response data of alumni from Solomon Islands.

For Solomon Islands, there were 180 alumni included in the target population. Responses were received from 37, a **response rate of 21 per cent**. Among these respondents, 16 were scholarship alumni and 21 were fellowship alumni.

The survey data provide a valuable quantitative insight into alumni use of knowledge and skills, development of networks and contribution to cooperation with Australia. The responses also offer rich examples from alumni of the types of contributions they are making, the way in which they are using their award, and the things that help and hinder them in reaching their potential.

The data detailed here are reported based on the four long-term outcomes of the Australia Awards as articulated in the *Australia Awards Global Strategy: Investing in the next generation of global leaders for development 2016-2018* and the Australia Awards Global Monitoring and Evaluation Framework. In terms of responding to the **long-term outcomes** of the Australia Awards, the following summary offers findings based on the responses of alumni from Solomon Islands. Further outcomes are included in the infographic following this summary.

Outcome 1: Alumni are using their skills, knowledge and networks to contribute to sustainable development.

- All alumni from Solomon Islands indicated they have passed on their skills and knowledge to others in their country on return from their award.
- All alumni indicated they had introduced improved practices and innovations in their work on return from their award.

Outcome 2: Alumni are contributing to cooperation between Australia and partner countries.

- 47 per cent of alumni from Solomon Islands have maintained frequent contact with fellow alumni, while 45 per cent have frequent contact with friends in Australia and 32 per cent with Australian students/alumni.
- In terms of frequent contact with Australian organisations, 29 per cent of alumni have frequent contact with Australian institutions, 33 per cent of alumni have frequent contact with Australian businesses and 36 per cent with Australian Embassies, High Commissions or Consulates.

Outcome 3: Effective, mutually advantageous partnerships between institutions and businesses in Australia and partner countries.

- 44 per cent of alumni from Solomon Islands indicated having had a professional link with an Australian organisation at some time following award.
- These links were with Australian universities, the government sector, the private sector and non-government organisations.

Outcome 4: Alumni view Australia, Australians and Australian expertise positively.

- Most alumni from Solomon Islands (94 per cent) indicated their experience in Australia positively influenced their perception of Australia.
- Most alumni (88 per cent) have provided advice to people in Solomon Islands about pursuing opportunities in Australia.

The Tracer Survey represented the views of a range of alumni from Solomon Islands. Of those who responded, **41 per cent were women and 89 per cent came from an urban location**. The largest age group represented were alumni 40 to 49 years. Among all alumni, 89 per cent were employed full-time. Of those alumni employed, **77 per cent** indicated that they hold a **formal leadership role**.

The data tables correspond to each of the Australia Awards long-term outcomes and include benchmark data from the entire survey response population.



alumni voices

I am involved in mentoring graduate engineers, and I have contributed to the establishment of a new curriculum for Construction Management at the Solomon Islands National University under support of the Australian Government through DFAT.

I developed clinical guideline procedures for nurses for neonates and preterm infants. I initiated the Kangaroo Mother Care for low birth weight infants in the special care nursery ward.

Working smart is what I do best. We used to compile government finance data and the process of updating the data was basically manual when I first worked under my supervisor. With my advanced knowledge, I automated the data update process. Now a task that used to take at most two weeks can be completed in a single day.

I am collaborating with organisations such as Oxfam and the International Women's Development Agency (IWDA), who work on gender and women's empowerment, by providing input to their programs, the areas to focus and the stakeholders to engage with in the Solomon's. Our shared sentiment of Melbourne is an ice-breaker with some Australians that come to work in the Solomon's.
