Subject: Inclusion of Australian Truffles in the Australia-India Comprehensive Economic Cooperation
Agreement (AI-CECA) – HS Code 2003.90, Current Import Tariff 30%

On behalf of the Australian Truffle Industry Association (ATIA), I am writing to formally request the inclusion of fresh Australian truffles and value-added truffle products in the Australia-India Comprehensive Economic Cooperation Agreement.

Industry Overview

ATIA represents Australia's national truffle production industry, which has demonstrated significant growth through the development of innovative, high-value-per-hectare truffle orchards. Our industry achievements include:

- A current farmgate value of approximately A\$12 million (FY2023), projected to reach A\$30 million by 2030
- Fresh truffle exports valued at A\$8 million (FY2023), expected to reach A\$20-25 million by 2030
- Production across multiple regions including Western Australia, Tasmania, New South Wales, South Australia,
 Canberra, Queensland and Victoria.

Market Opportunity

The Australia-India Comprehensive Economic Cooperative Agreement (AI-CECA) presents a transformative opportunity for the Australian truffle industry for several reasons:

- India's growing middle class demonstrates increasing demand for premium culinary products
- Current high tariffs (30%) significantly restrict market access
- India has no domestic truffle production, eliminating concerns about protecting local industry
- The Australian truffle season aligns with major Indian festivals and celebrations
- Rising demand from India's expanding fine-dining sector and professional culinary community

Strategic Benefits

Including truffles in the AI-CECA would deliver mutual advantages:

- Enhanced Market Access: Reduced tariffs would enable Australian producers to better serve India's growing gourmet food sector
- Economic Development: Increased exports would create jobs in Australian agriculture and strengthen our position in premium food exports
- Cultural Exchange: Integration of Australian truffles into Indian cuisine would deepen bilateral cultural ties
- Environmental Sustainability: Our industry's sustainable practices align with both nations' environmental commitments

Export Readiness

The Australian truffle industry is uniquely positioned to serve the Indian market:

- 75-90% of current production is export-oriented
- Established reputation for world-class product quality
- Proven capability in international market supply
- Comprehensive range including fresh truffles and value-added products (oils, sauces, and seasonings)

Request for Action

We respectfully request the inclusion of fresh truffles and truffle products in the next round of AI-CECA negotiations, with particular focus on reducing the current 30% import tariff. This amendment would support the agreement's broader goals of enhancing bilateral trade and economic cooperation.
