

Good Morning Ladies and Gentlemen,

I am delighted to be here today to welcome you all to the Vietnam - Australia Energy Roundtable 2018.

Energy is one of the key sectors driving our strong bilateral trade. An example is coal - Vietnam's growth has been so rapid that it has quickly turned from being a net coal exporter, to being a net coal importer. As the second largest thermal coal exporter in the world, Australian coal is helping to fuel this growth, with \$572 million of Australian coal exported to Vietnam last financial year alone.

Our relationship in helping to supply Vietnam's energy growth will likely broaden from coal and into LNG in the years to come. Vietnam has ambitious plans for LNG import development, and Australia stands well positioned to be a part of this industry growth. Australia is rapidly expanding our LNG export capacity through several new projects, some of which have commenced production, and other large scale projects which are under construction and are due to come online over the next few years. This expansion activity will see Australia's LNG export volumes more than triple to around 76 million metric tonnes by 2020.

As well as being a major supplier of energy, Australia has deep experience in policy, technology and innovation to meet an everchanging energy landscape.

The success of the Australian Government's energy policy framework has been the delivery of Australia's energy needs through competitive and well-regulated markets. Australia's energy regulator is visiting

Vietnam next month as part of the MOU signed with Vietnam's energy regulator in 2017. It is just one of the many partnerships where Vietnam and Australia are working hand in hand to develop institutional frameworks to further trade and investment.

Government, industry and research institutions are also positioning Australia for our energy future, as we work toward the goal of increasing Australia's renewable energy resources within our own national energy mix. Wind and solar continue to grow as a share of Australia's energy supply, easing pressure on our grid and contributing to a cleaner carbon foot print.

Australia is also furthering sustainability through the export of our world leading clean coal technology companies. Coal mining in Australia is an increasingly sophisticated and hi-tech sector. Continuous improvement in mining technology, health, safety and environmental performance, have ensured that Australia is an efficient and reliable producer of quality, low emissions coal. As Vietnam transitions both to cleaner coal and renewable energy solutions, Australian industry stands ready to collaborate and assist.

I would like to thank Vietnam's Ministry of Industry and Trade for their support to Austrade in organising today's energy forum. The forum will provide a great opportunity to share knowledge on Vietnam's energy development needs, Government priorities, and opportunities for industry collaboration.

This forum also creates an opportunity for Vietnamese delegates to explore partnerships with the seven Australian energy businesses with expertise spanning technology and services, infrastructure, engineering, coal, LNG and renewables.

I am delighted to be here today together with HE Vice Minister - Do Thang Hai (TBA) to welcome you to today's Vietnam - Australia Energy Forum.

Vietnam is an important partner to Australia.

Our two nations share a number of common interests, including energy development and security.

Following the visits to Australia by two Vietnamese Ministerial led energy delegations in 2015 and 2016, today's Energy Forum is organised by the Australian Government and the Vietnam Ministry of Industry and Trade to share knowledge on energy policies, regulatory frameworks, discuss energy projects in Vietnam and showcase Australia's expertise and capability in supplying coal and LNG, developing and operating bulk commodity ports and LNG terminals, power and environmental services.

The Forum also creates a unique opportunity for Vietnamese delegates to explore partnerships with the 22 representatives from the Australian energy industry.

Well-functioning energy markets working efficiently in tandem with other key markets such as carbon and financial markets are unarguably best placed to drive business innovation and produce sustainable, reliable and least-cost energy and climate change solutions.

As the world's eighth-largest energy producer and a near neighbour to Asian economies, Australia is well placed to be a leading energy supplier to Asia. This is reflected in the doubling of our energy exports from \$24 billion in 2004–05 to almost \$60 billion in 2015-16, when they accounted for around a third of Australia's total commodity exports.

Over the next two and a half decades, Australia's energy production is

Coal mining in Australia is an increasingly sophisticated and hi-tech activity. Continuous improvements in mining technology, health and safety and environmental performance, have ensured that Australia is an efficient and reliable producer of quality, low emissions coal.

Government policies, industry investment and funded research is positioning Australia to utilise its substantial renewable energy resources. Wind and solar continue to grow. Wind comprises one-third of renewable generation in Australia. This is increasing the renewable energy contribution to electricity supply and contributing to a lower emission intensity.

However, the shift from coal-fired generators to wind and solar PV generators has implications for security and reliability. This is bringing together the intellectual capital, power industry capability, research and technology that is changing the way the industry operates.

Vietnam and Australia face similar energy challenges, so I hope that with the industry delegates participating in this Forum, there is an opportunity for Australian and Vietnamese organisations to sit down together with the facilitation of both our governments, to discuss possible co-operation on a win-win merit and sustainable development basis for the sector.
