We are seeing a number of Australian citizens prohibited from departing China due to the imposition of exit bans

Background

An 'exit ban' is where a Chinese authority imposes an order to prevent a person departing China. The bans are often put in place as a result of civil investigations or proceedings on legal issues concerning the person either directly or indirectly. Often persons who are subject to these bans only become aware of the ban when they are departing the country.

Since the 2016 bilateral consultations we are aware of \$47F(1) cases where Australians have been prevented from departing China due to exit bans imposed without their knowledge. \$47F(1)



Background

An 'exit ban' is where a Chinese authority (usually, but not limited to, a court) imposes an order to prevent a person departing China. The bans are often put in place as a result of civil investigations or proceedings on legal issues concerning the person either directly or indirectly. Often persons who are subject to these bans only become aware of the ban when they are departing the country.

We have had cases come to our attention to date where citizens have been prevented from departing China due to exit bans. s 33(b), s 33(a)(iii)

In most cases, the bans are issued without any prior notification or reason given in advance of the person attempting to depart the country. Often, information on how to enquire about or contest the ban is limited and there is no apparent judicial oversight or redress mechanism.
