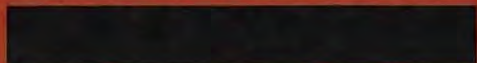

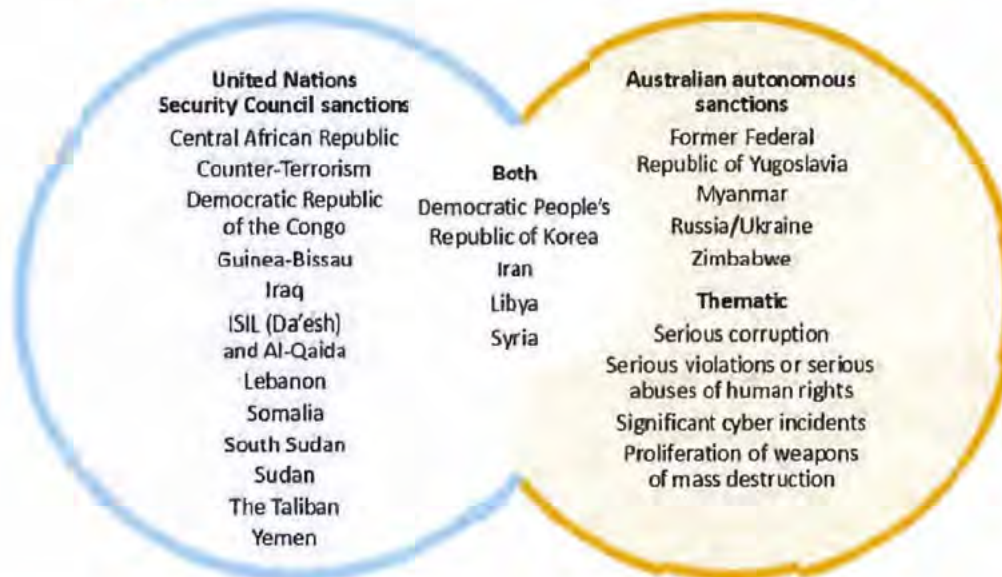

A responsive consular service

Our consular services are the most meaningful way Australians overseas interact with the Department

Demands (and costs) are rising.

There are over one million Australians overseas at any time. Demand for our services is growing due to

- population growth
- increased propensity to travel, and to travel to riskier destinations
- lower uptake of travel insurance, possibly due to cost considerations
- more natural disasters
- increased community expectations

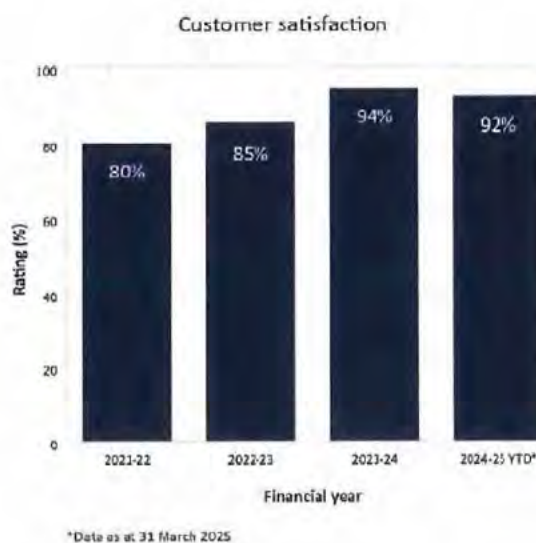
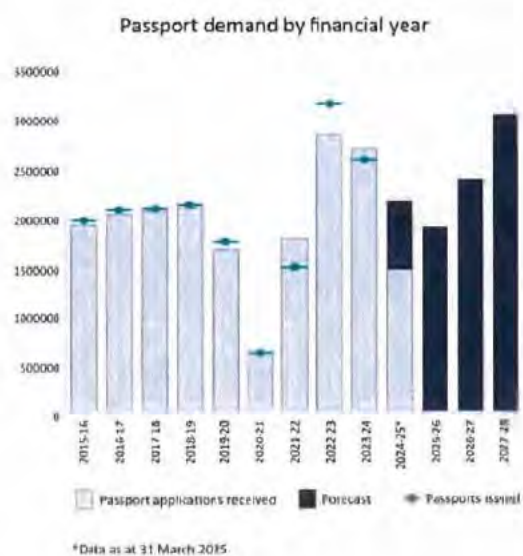

World-class passports

Post-COVID, demand patterns fluctuate.

Passport demand is forecast to reduce in 2025-26. This is because fewer child passports (which have a five-year validity) will require renewal.

Processing timeframes are meeting our targets. Customer satisfaction is high. Flexible staffing arrangements are in place to manage future surges.



Australia's passports are among the world's most secure.

Our advanced secure technology helps prevent counterfeit and identity theft.

Australia is ranked equal 6th in the world in the Henley Index 2025, allowing Australians to travel visa-free to 186 countries. This saves Australians on visa costs.

Passport fees rise with inflation on 1 January each year.

Budget

Through the **2025-26 Federal Budget**, the Department's resourcing sits at \$8.8 billion for the financial year, which is an increase in \$268.2 million on the previous year. This includes

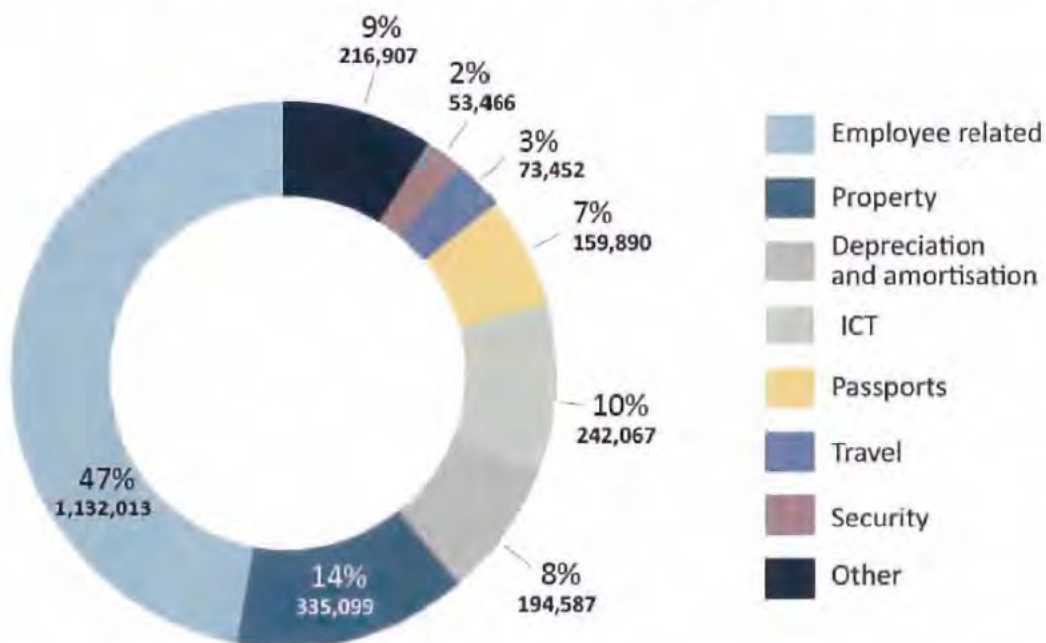
- \$4.4 billion in Administered ODA

- \$3.5 billion in total Departmental Appropriation, of which

\$0.1 billion flows to the Departmental Capital Budget

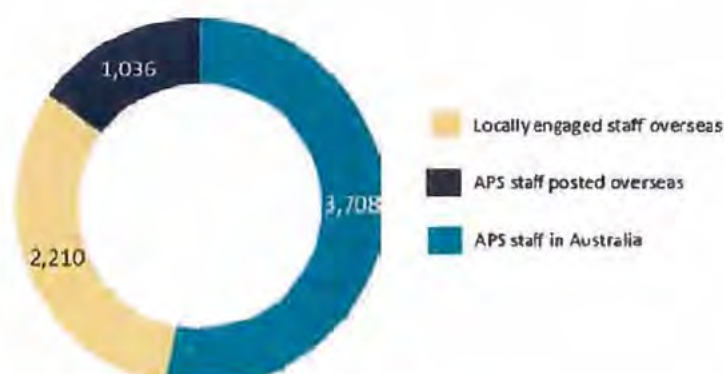

As at 31 March 2025 the DFAT average staffing level (ASL) allocation is 6,954 comprising

- 3,708 APS staff in Australia
- 1,036 APS staff posted overseas
- 2,210 locally engaged staff (LES) employed overseas.

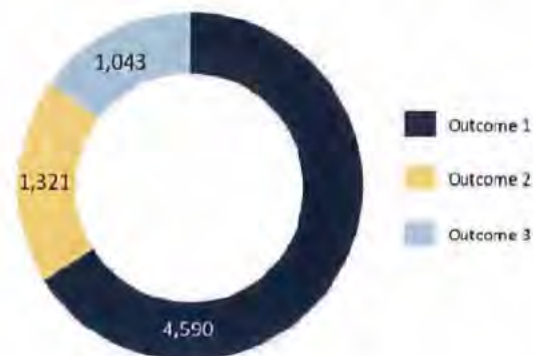
DFAT ASL distribution (by location)



DFAT's staff effort is distributed across three core outcomes.

1. The advancement of Australia's international strategic, security and economic interests, including through bilateral, regional and multilateral engagement on Australian Government **foreign, trade and international development** policy priorities.
2. The protection and welfare of Australians abroad and access to secure international travel documentation through timely and responsive travel advice and **consular and passport services** in Australia and overseas.
3. A **secure Australian Government presence** overseas through the provision of security services and information and communications technology infrastructure, and the management of the Commonwealth's overseas property estate.

Contractors

As at 31 March 2025, there were 784 contractors compared to 852 in June 2022. Contractor numbers peaked in November 2022 at 1,375 due to surge in passport demand.

- DFAT's contractors supplement the APS and locally engaged staff (LES) workforce where capability gaps exist or where short term fluctuations in demand require temporary resourcing solutions.
- Approximately one third (34 per cent) of DFAT's contractors are engaged by the Australian Passports Office, while around 25 per cent work in ICT and digital functions.
- The remaining contractors provide temporary support across a range of functions including communication and marketing, accounting and finance, and security services.

Our overseas staffing footprint

- DFAT has approximately 1,030 APS (A-based) staff posted overseas, and approximately 2,200 locally engaged staff (LES) overseas.
- DFAT supports 29 partner agencies in the overseas network

DFAT recoups the costs incurred in supporting partner agency deployments through a cost recovery model.

Other agencies have over 1,600 A-based posted overseas, and 1,960 LES.

- This represents 52 per cent of the overseas network.

- Separately, we are supported by 49 Honorary Consuls (47 managed by DFAT, 2 by Austrade).

Staff retention

- After peaking during COVID-19, the separation rate has dropped to 8.3 per cent (YTD).
 - Attrition peaked at 12.6 per cent in 2022-23, this covered the later part of the COVID-19 acute phase.

Property

As you know, the overseas property portfolio is a significant government asset which provides a safe and secure platform for whole-of-government operations. The Department is continuously adapting it to meet the challenges posed by the escalating global security threat environment.

- The Commonwealth, represented by the Overseas Property Office, owns 115 properties (including chanceries, residences, and compounds) overseas with an asset value of \$3.4 billion.

- over 2024, the Department completed 215 property projects (with a value of \$24.8 million), including construction of the new Tarawa Chancery and residences, Washington AUKUS tenancy, major building engineering service upgrades in Hanoi and Kuala Lumpur and completed 12,609 reactive works, globally.

Current challenges

National Security Office Precinct (NSOP)

- In October 2022, DFAT was announced as an anchor tenant in the NSOP in Barton, currently planned for occupation by 2030.
- This provided an opportunity to consolidate the Canberra DFAT workforce in close proximity, with upcoming civic leases expiring by 2027. DFAT found a suitable property to lease at 19 National Circuit. Occupation is expected in 2027.

Regulatory functions

Australian Safeguards and Non-Proliferation Office (ASNO)

DG ASNO is a statutory appointment, reporting directly to the Minister for Foreign Affairs, which is responsible for Australia's civilian and military safeguards and nuclear security regulation, including

- applying domestic regulation to ensure Australia's various WMD non-proliferation and security international treaty obligations are met
- supporting the IAEA to improve verification mechanisms and supporting partners across the Indo-Pacific region to strengthen their non-proliferation treaty implementation
- leading negotiations with the IAEA and AUKUS partners to develop first-of-a-kind verification arrangements and technologies needed for nuclear powered submarines
- providing specialist advice to the Minister on technical aspects of non-proliferation and the Minister's regulatory responsibilities.

Australian Sanctions Office (ASO)

As the Australian Government's sanctions regulator, the ASO

- provides guidance to regulated entities, including government agencies, individuals, business and other organisations on Australian sanctions law
- processes applications for, and issues, sanctions permits
- works with individuals, business and other organisations to promote compliance and help prevent breaches of the law
- works in partnership with other agencies to monitor compliance with sanctions legislation
- supports corrective and enforcement action by law enforcement agencies in cases of suspected non-compliance.

Foreign Arrangements Branch (FAB)

The Foreign Arrangements Scheme commenced on 10 December 2020 to ensure arrangements between state or territory governments (and their entities) and foreign entities do not adversely affect Australia's foreign relations and are not inconsistent with Australia's foreign policy. FAB's responsibilities include

- providing guidance and training to state and territory entities on their obligations under the Scheme and working with them to promote compliance with the Scheme, and resolve any instances of non-compliance
- maintaining the Public Register which includes information about foreign arrangements notified under the Scheme.

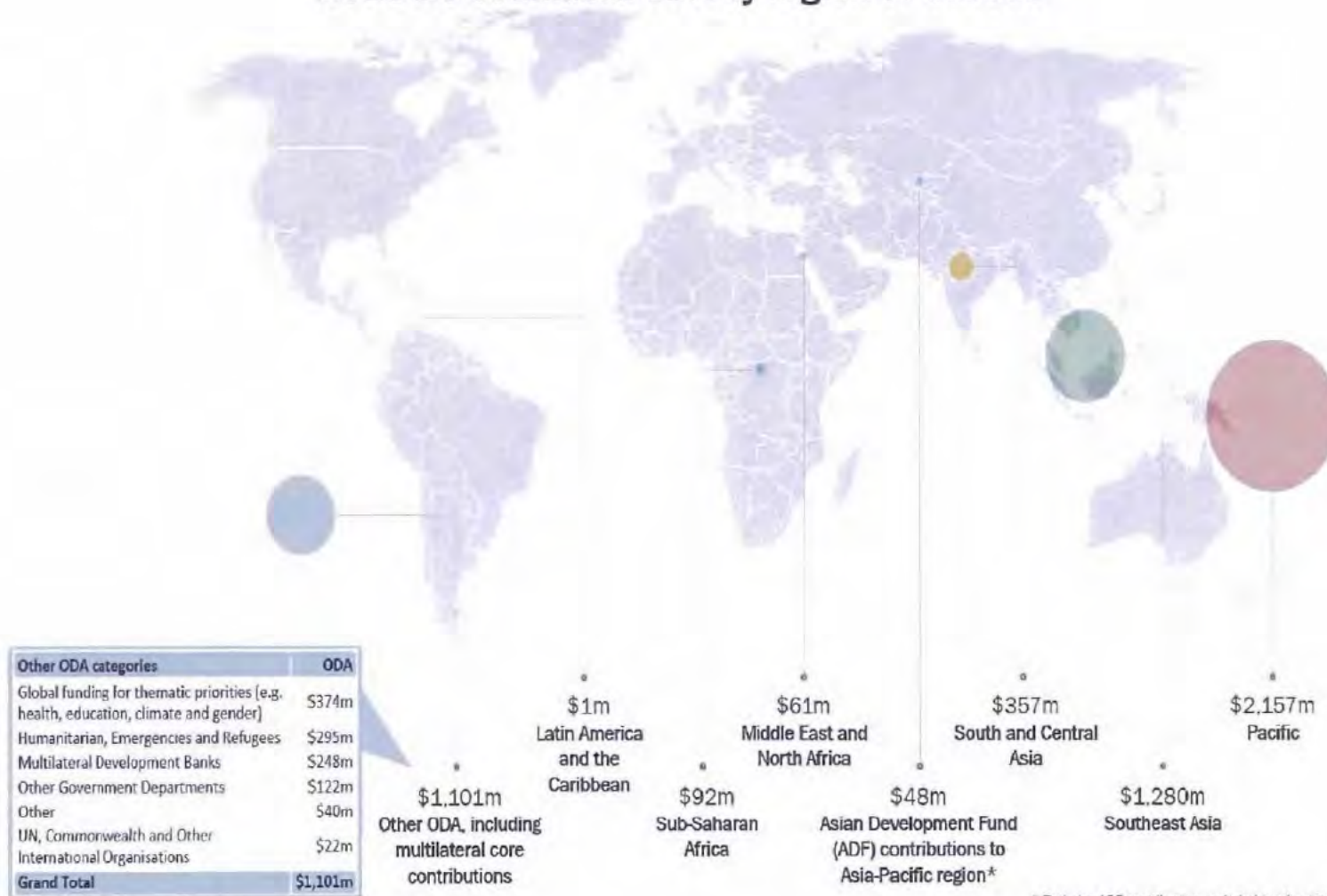
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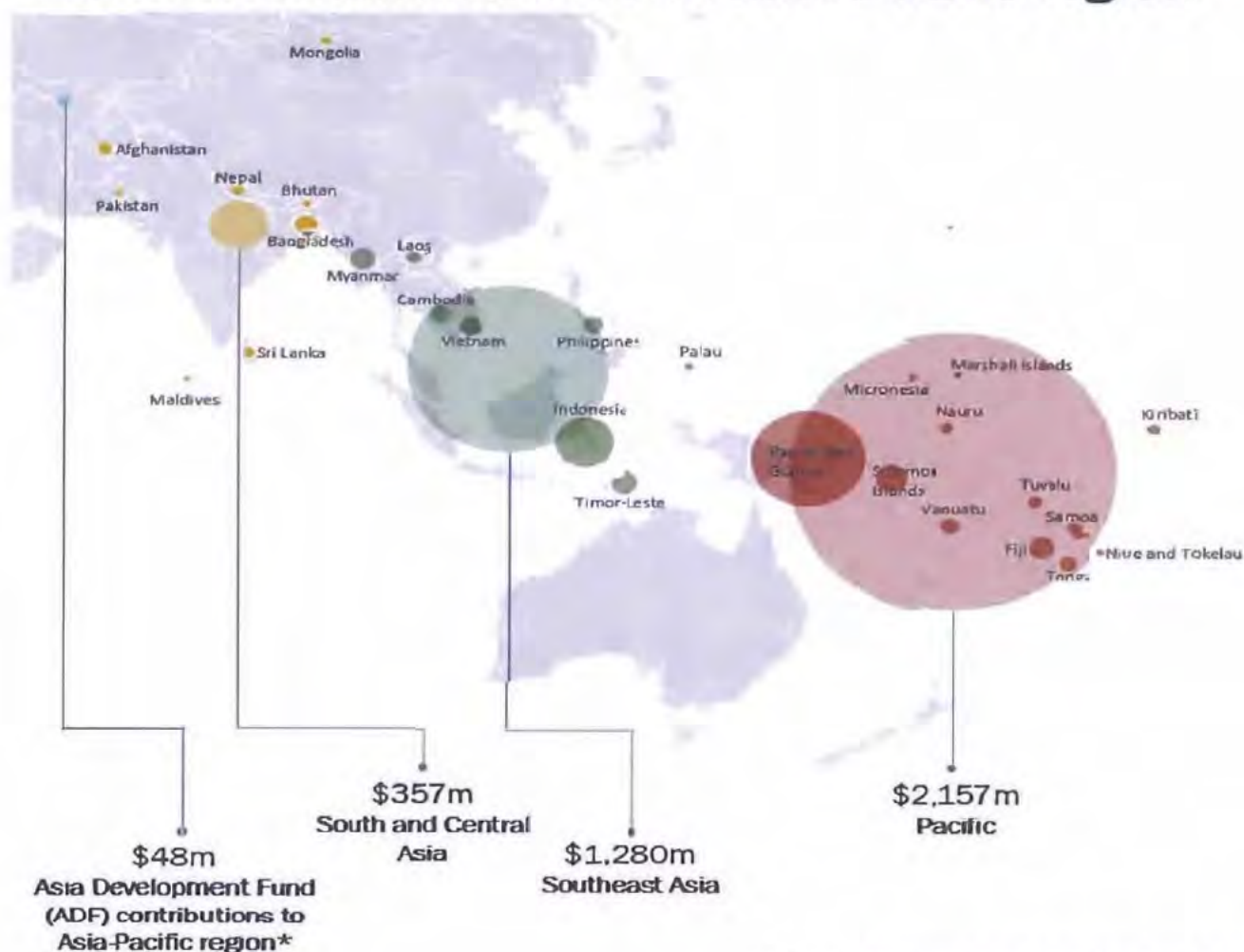
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2025-26 estimated ODA by region of benefit



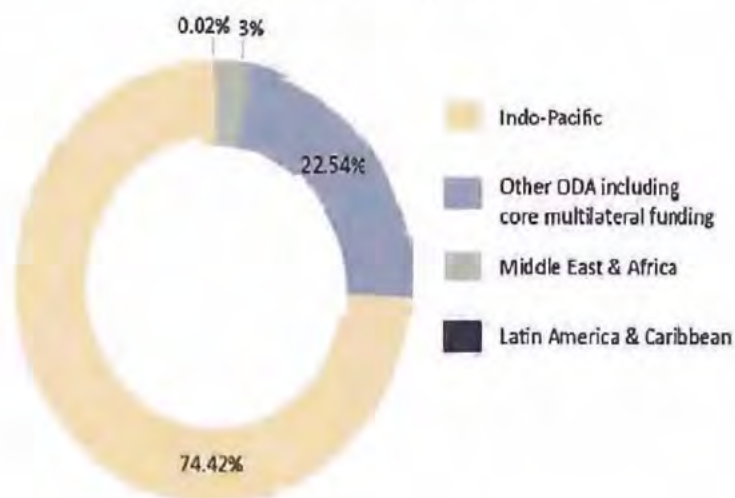

2025-26 estimated ODA for Indo-Pacific region



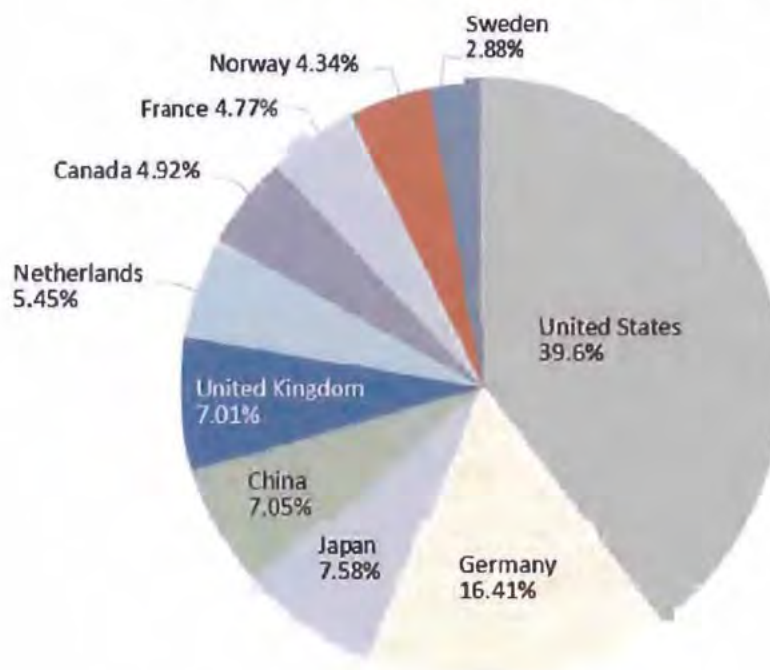

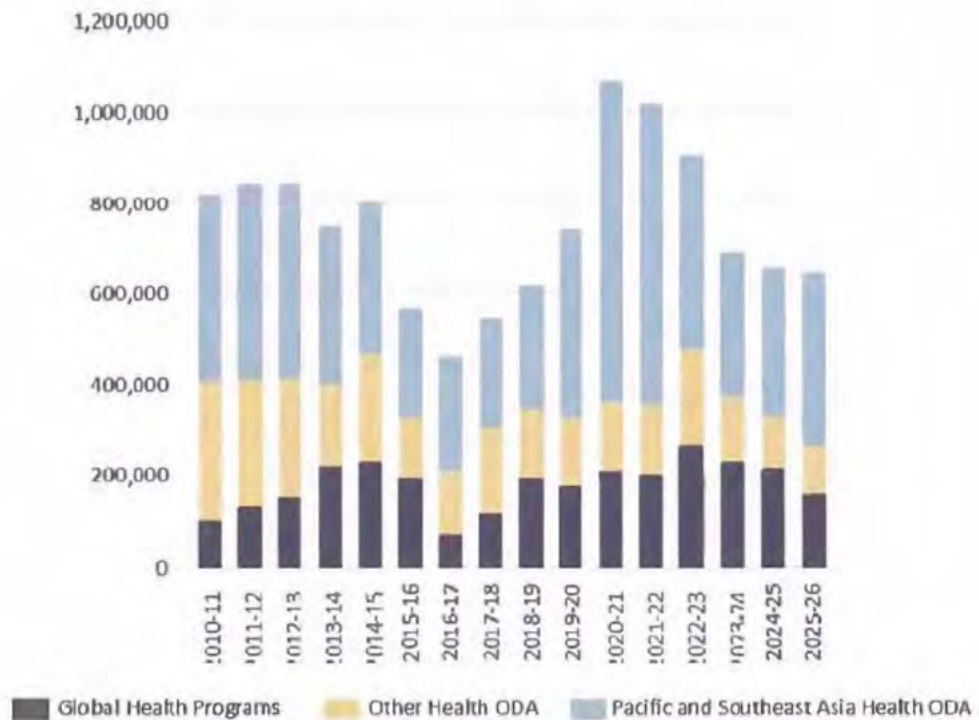


Share of global health funding by donor 2023

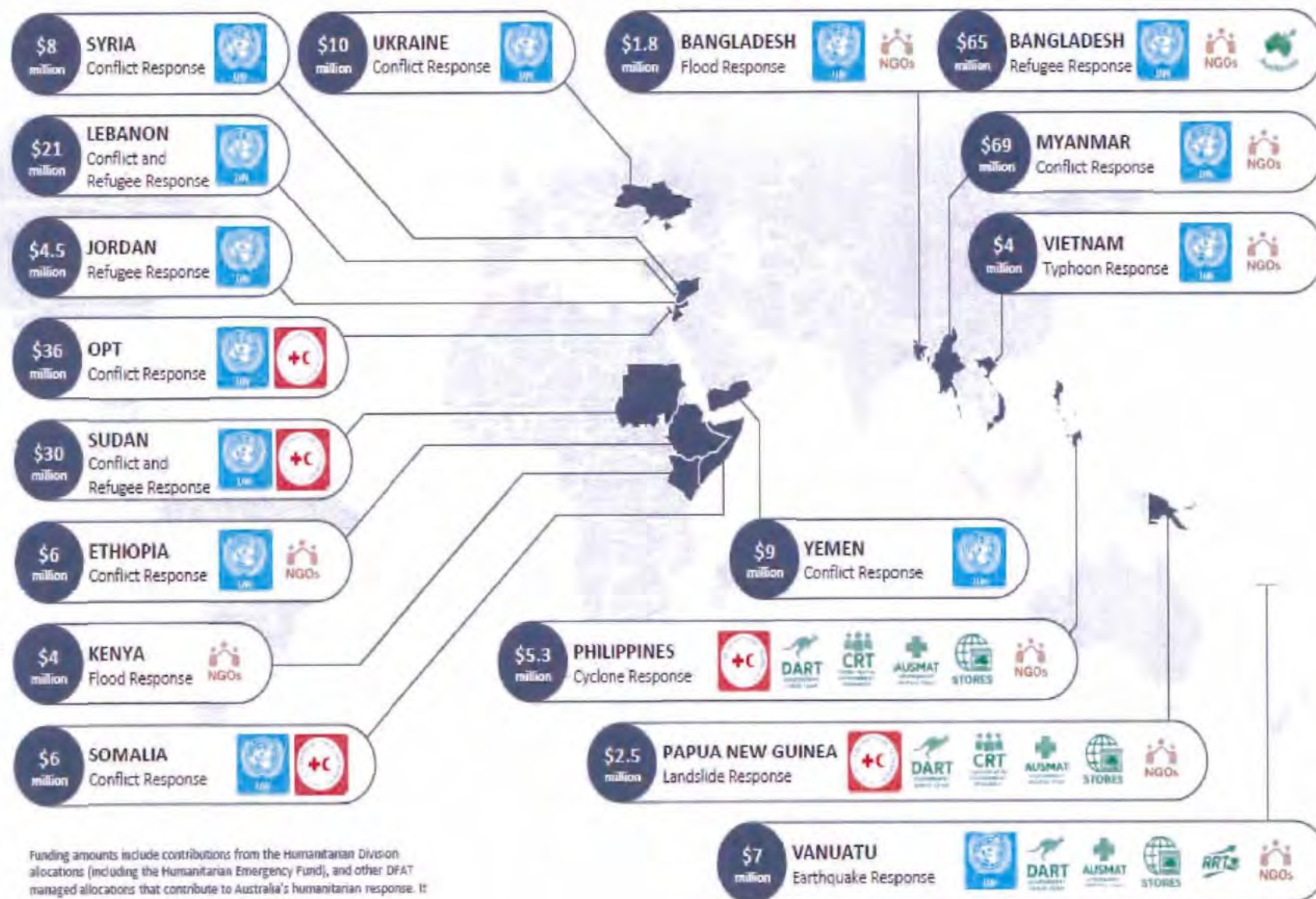
Australian humanitarian capability

- We have two internationally accredited **urban search and rescue** teams from QLD and NSW.
- Australian **medical teams** (AUSMAT) with fully self-supported field hospitals based in Darwin that can be rapidly deployed.
- Access to a database of over 1000 **civilian humanitarian experts** including engineers, logisticians etc.
- Our **humanitarian warehouse** based in Brisbane – the largest in the southern hemisphere – maintains Australian relief supplies to respond to three simultaneous crises and assist over 55,000 people.
- DFAT often works with the **Australian Defence Force** to deploy humanitarian response teams **s 47E(d), s 47C(1)**

- Partnerships with the Australian Red Cross, NGOs and UN partners provide **early warning systems** to the Pacific and Southeast Asia, with pre-positioned supplies in warehouses across the Pacific.

How we fund sudden onset, refugee and protracted humanitarian crises.

- An annual **\$150 million Humanitarian Emergency Fund** that can provide rapid funding to natural disasters or in response to conflict.
- A \$370 million 3-year package to address rapidly escalating humanitarian crises in **Myanmar**, supporting the largest refugee camp in the world in Bangladesh (Rohingya) and minimising the risks of people movement.
- Strategic **funding partnerships** with ICRC, UNHCR, UNOCHA, WFP and Australian NGOs to support global operations, particularly in the Indo-Pacific region.

VOLUNTEERS

The ODA Australian Volunteers Program (AVP) matches skilled Australians with organisations in 25 countries to build capacity and deepen people-to-people links.

- AVP has supported 365 assignments since July 2024 – 192 are currently underway.

Official Development Assistance (ODA) vs non-ODA

ODA is an investment in the welfare or economic development of a low or middle income country.

- Country and program eligibility is set by the OECD Development Assistance Committee (DAC).
- Normally delivered through **grants** (such as health, gender, education, governance and humanitarian assistance) as well as concessional loans.
- Estimated total ODA budget for 2025-26 is \$5.1 billion, with 75 per cent spent in the Indo-Pacific.

Non-ODA funding does not meet the strict OECD criteria but can contribute to development

This includes **military aid**, some **policing or security sector support**, some aspects of labour mobility schemes and **non-concessional finance**.

Some of our development partners are not considered low or middle income, such as the Cook Islands in the Pacific.

- Nauru is due to graduate from the OECD list of eligible ODA recipients on 1 January 2026, subject to upcoming GNI forecasts (and would therefore no longer be eligible for ODA assistance).

MANAGING RISK – PREVENTING TERRORISM FINANCING, FRAUD AND CORRUPTION

We deliver development assistance in complex, highly fluid environments. Achieving our strategic objectives requires DFAT to **engage with, rather than avoid, risk**. We typically work with and through delivery partners, often limiting our direct control over program risks. We therefore:

- assess a partner's ability to comply with DFAT policy requirements before we contract them
- have a **zero tolerance approach** to fraud, corruption, sexual and child exploitation/abuse, and mandatory reporting, and
- apply **robust risk management practices** to mitigate terrorism financing risk, and
 - check terrorist organisations and sanctions lists and require delivery partners to ensure resources do not support terrorism.

DFAT CAPABILITY

DFAT is delivering the Government's commitment to uplift development capability to maximise development effectiveness (announced 2023-24 budget) and has:

- finalised 16 country and regional Development Partnership Plans **s 47E(d), s 47C(1), s 33(a)(iii)**
- introduced Development Senior Responsible Officers across all major country and regional programs to strengthen program leadership
- expanded staff training and support, evaluation and monitoring of program impact.

It is essential DFAT staff have the knowledge and skills to deliver effective development programs that deepen our reputation as a professional, long-term, trustworthy partner in the region.

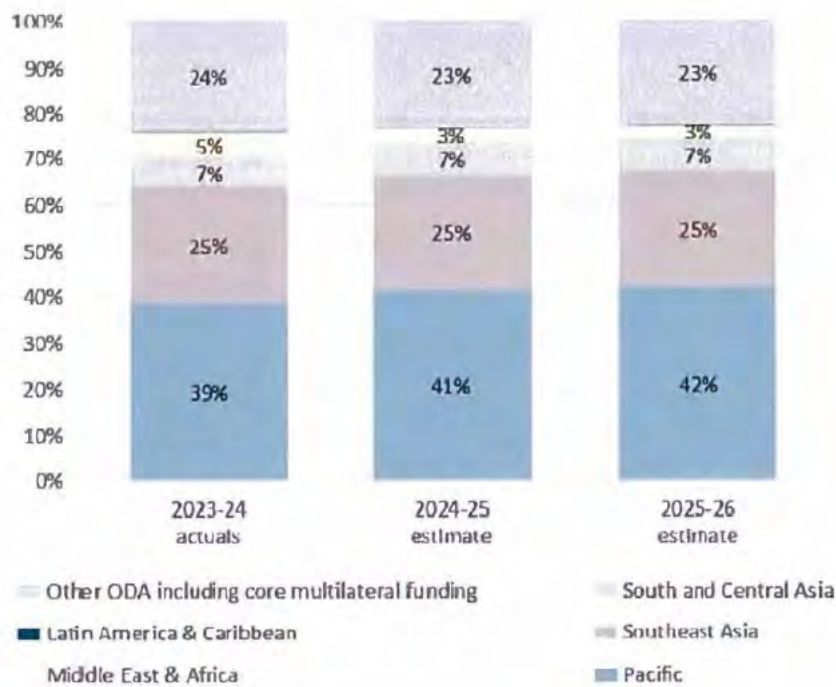

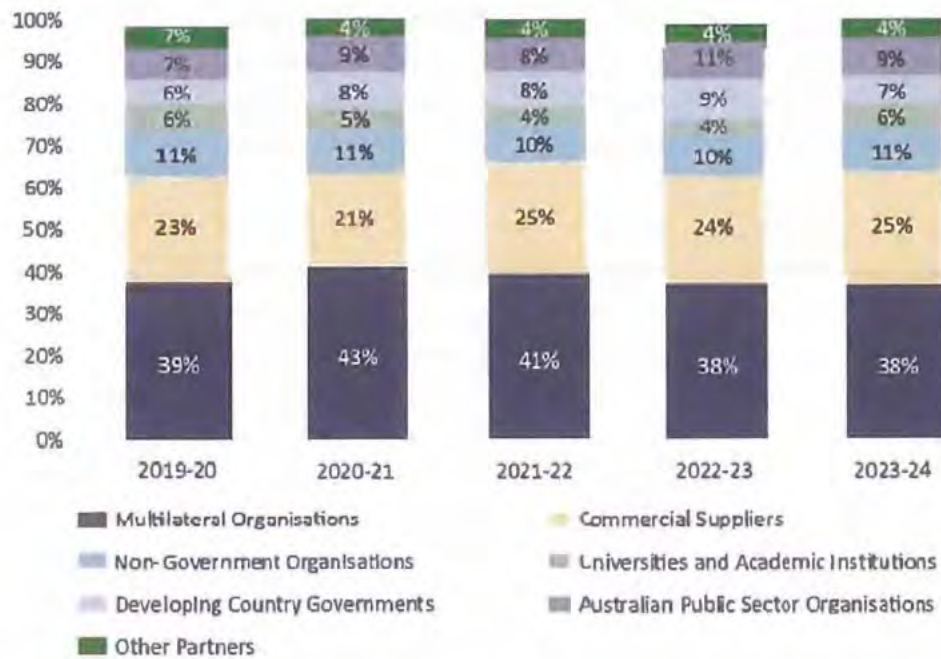

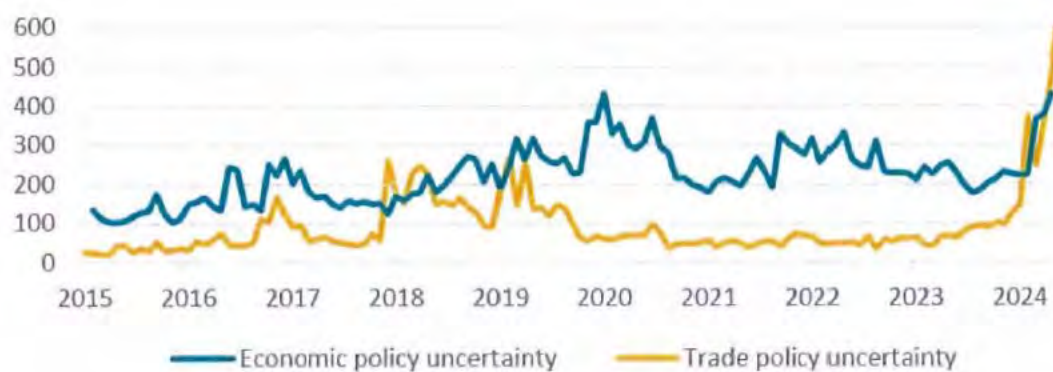

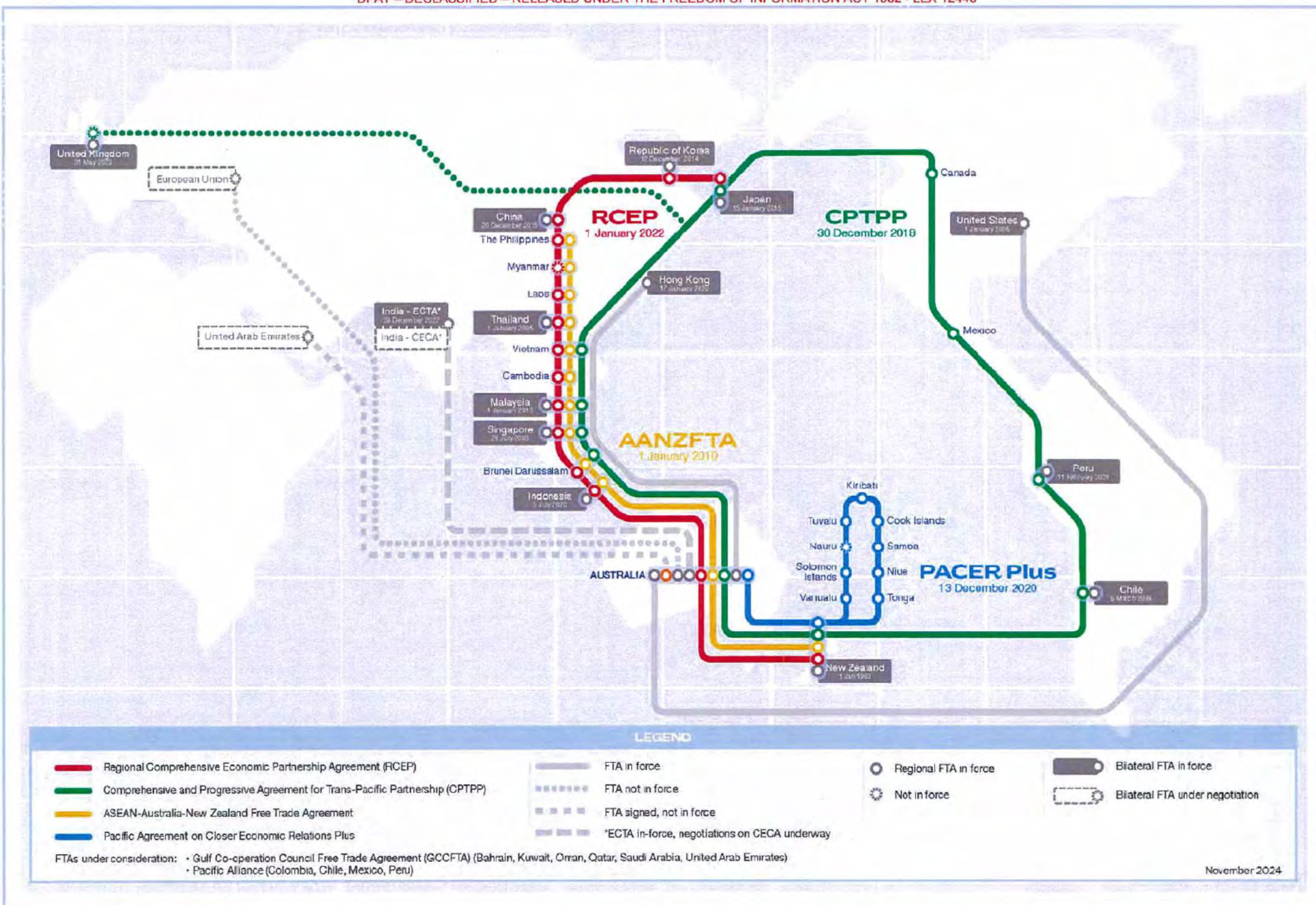

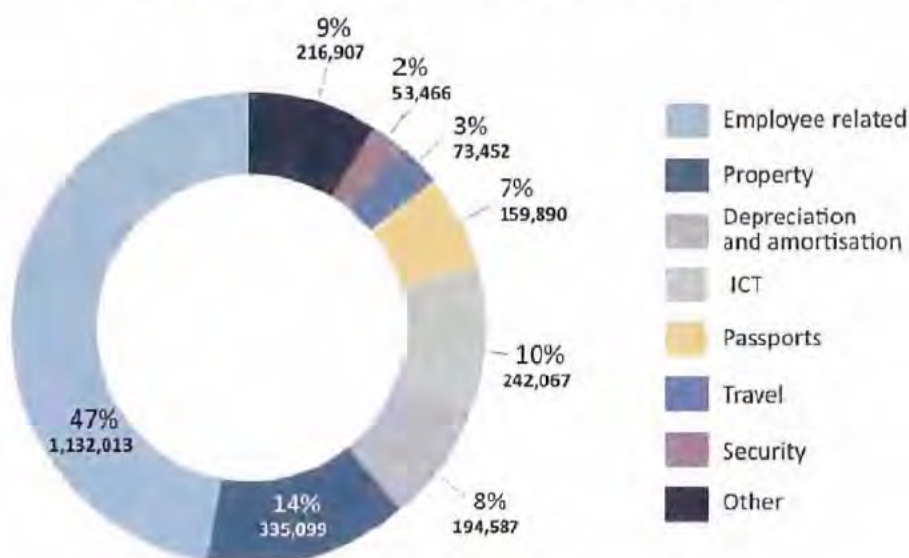

- Through the 2025-26 Federal Budget, the Department's resourcing sits at \$8.8 million for the financial year, which is an increase in \$268.2 million on the previous year. This includes:

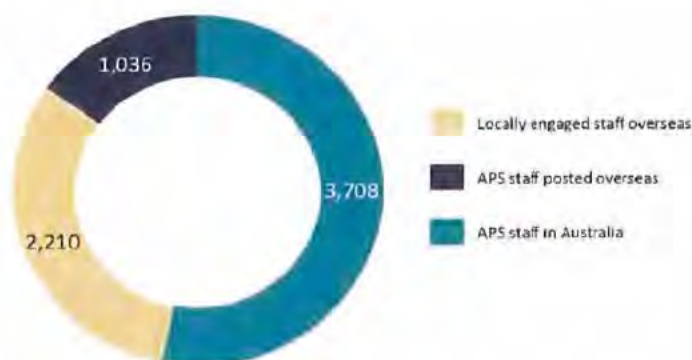
A diverse and capable staff is essential to fulfil DFAT's mandate in an increasingly complex global environment. Our staffing profile is highly mobile, and has faced challenges through COVID-19 and in rebuilding afterwards. We have worked hard in recent years to recruit, train and upskill at all levels and across all workforce streams. **s 47E(d), s 47C(1)**

DFAT's Average Staffing Level (ASL)

As at 31 March 2025 the DFAT average staffing level (ASL) allocation is 6,954 comprising:

- 3,708 APS staff in Australia
- 1,036 APS staff posted overseas
- 2,210 locally engaged staff (LES) employed overseas

DFAT ASL distribution (by location)



DFAT's staff effort is distributed across the following three core outcomes:

- the advancement of Australia's international strategic, security and economic interests, including through bilateral, regional and multilateral engagement on Australian Government **foreign, trade and international development** policy priorities
- we have five divisions in the Trade and Investment Group (TIG), but geographic areas in DFAT also cover trade and economic issues. In that sense trade is integrated throughout the department
- the protection and welfare of Australians abroad and access to secure international travel documentation through timely and responsive travel advice and **consular and passport services** in Australia and overseas
- a **secure Australian Government presence** overseas through the provision of security services and information and communications technology infrastructure, and the management of the Commonwealth's overseas property estate.

Contractors

As at 31 March 2025, there were 784 contractors compared to 852 in June 2022. Contractor numbers peaked in November 2022 at 1,375 due to a surge in passport demand.

- DFAT's contractors supplement the APS and locally engaged staff (LES) workforce where capability gaps exist or where short term fluctuations in demand require temporary resourcing solutions.
- Approximately one third (34 per cent) of DFAT's contractors are engaged by the Australian Passports Office, while around 25 per cent work in ICT and digital functions.
- The remaining contractors provide temporary support across a range of functions including communication and marketing, accounting and finance, and security services.

Our overseas staffing footprint

DFAT has approximately 1,030 APS (A-based) staff posted overseas, and approximately 2,200 locally engaged staff (LES) overseas.

DFAT supports 29 partner agencies in the overseas network.

- DFAT recoups the costs incurred in supporting partner agency deployments through a cost recovery model.
- Other agencies have over 1,600 A based posted overseas, and 1,960 LES.
 - this represents 52 per cent of the overseas network.

Separately, we are supported by 49 Honorary Consuls [47 managed by DFAT, 2 managed by Austrade].

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PROPERTY

The overseas property portfolio is a significant government asset which provides a safe and secure platform for whole-of-government operations. The Department is continuously adapting it to meet the challenges posed by the escalating global security threat environment.

- The Commonwealth, represented by the Overseas Property Office (OPO), owns 115 properties (including chanceries, residences, and compounds) overseas with an asset value of \$3.4 billion.

Current challenges

National Security Office Precinct (NSOP)

- In October 2022, DFAT was announced as an anchor tenant in the NSOP in Barton, currently planned for occupation by 2030.
- This provided an opportunity to consolidate the Canberra DFAT workforce in close proximity, with upcoming civic leases expiring by 2027. DFAT found a suitable property to lease at 19 National Circuit. Occupation is expected in 2027.

REGULATORY FUNCTIONS

Australian Sanctions Office (ASO)

As the Australian Government's sanctions regulator, the ASO

- provides guidance to regulated entities, including government agencies, individuals, business and other organisations on Australian sanctions law
- processes applications for, and issues, sanctions permits
- works with individuals, business and other organisations to promote compliance and help prevent breaches of the law
- works in partnership with other agencies to monitor compliance with sanctions legislation
- supports corrective and enforcement action by law enforcement agencies in cases of suspected non-compliance

Foreign Arrangements Branch (FAB)

The Foreign Arrangements Scheme commenced on 10 December 2020 to ensure arrangements between state or territory governments (and their entities) and foreign entities do not adversely affect Australia's foreign relations and are not inconsistent with Australia's foreign policy

FAB's responsibilities include

- providing guidance and training to state and territory entities on their obligations under the Scheme and working with them to promote compliance with the Scheme, and resolve any instances of non-compliance
- maintaining the Public Register which includes information about foreign arrangements notified under the Scheme

Australian Safeguards and Non-Proliferation Office (ASNO)

Director General ASNO is a statutory appointment, reporting directly to the Minister for Foreign Affairs, which is responsible for Australia's civilian and military safeguards and nuclear security regulation, including

- applying domestic regulation to ensure Australia's various WMD non-proliferation and security international treaty obligations are met
- supporting the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) to improve verification mechanisms and supporting partners across the Indo-Pacific region to strengthen their non-proliferation treaty implementation
- leading negotiations with the IAEA and AUKUS partners to develop first-of-a-kind verification arrangements and technologies needed for nuclear powered submarines
- providing specialist advice to the Minister on technical aspects of non proliferation and the Minister's regulatory responsibilities
