ABC interview

- PM had an approximately 30 minute interview with Johnson Raela of *The Pacific*. Questions focused on Pre-COP, the Mobility Pathway, fossil fuels and Article 4.4.

Pathway was not one way – the whole objective is to bring people back to Tuvalu. Brain drain was not a new issue for Tuvalu – the difference was that Falepili was designed to be migration with dignity. It was not climate migration – it was circular mobility. s 22(1)(a)(ii)

- When asked for his final message, PM stated that people should remember that Falepili was about more than migration – it was a comprehensive agreement that covered security and climate adaptation.

Prime Minister Feleti Teo of Tuvalu has emphasised that the Pathway is not ‘one way traffic’ and will enable circular mobility that will strengthen Tuvalu’s resilience.

Under the Falepili Union Treaty, Australia and Tuvalu have committed to work together to help Tuvaluans to stay and thrive in their homeland. Australia has committed to an enhanced development partnership with Tuvalu, with increased support in priority areas such as healthcare, economic governance, infrastructure, and climate adaptation.

Along with our enhanced development partnership, Australia has recognised Tuvalu’s ongoing sovereignty regardless of the impacts of climate change-induced sea level rise and is obliged to respond to requests for assistance in the event of a natural disaster, military aggression or public health emergency of international concern.

s 22(1)(a)(ii) whom I had the pleasure of meeting in Brazil at COP30, shared your contact and mentioned that you would be the right person to help clarify some questions about the Australia–Tuvalu Falepili Union.

I have been following the developments of the initiative through media reports and official sources such as dfat.gov.au and falepilipathway.gov.au. I saw that the registration process for the Falepili Mobility Pathway visa closed in June this year, with 8,750 applications submitted, including family members of principal applicants.

Given this high level of interest—which, as I understand it, represents roughly 80% of Tuvalu’s population—and the fact that only 280 visas are planned to be granted annually, the topic raises several questions in class that I have not been able to answer based solely on publicly available news:

Won't the allocation of 280 visas per year de-populate Tuvalu?

- Australia and Tuvalu agreed to an allocation of 280 visas in the 2025-26 program year and have agreed to an allocation of 280 visas in the 2026-27 program year.
- The ballot provides a fair and transparent process by randomly selecting Tuvaluans to apply for the visa
 - it makes sure there is equal access for Tuvaluans of any skill level, occupation and gender.
- The Falepili Mobility Pathway provides citizens of Tuvalu the choice to travel to Australia – temporarily or permanently – to live, work, and study as permanent residents.
- The Falepili mobility pathway has in-built mechanisms to support circular migration by providing Falepili visa holders with the freedom for unlimited travel to and from Australia
 - this makes it easier for Tuvaluans to take skills and experience gained in Australia back to Tuvalu, contributing to the ongoing prosperity of Tuvalu
 - as Prime Minister Feleti Teo has said 'this isn't about one-way traffic'.

We're moving forward with the commitments under that treaty, but it's important to know that this is not one-way traffic. Prime Minister Feleti has used those words: it's not one-way traffic. Under the Falepili Union, we're providing Tuvaluans with a choice and some options to live, work and study in Australia, and we open our doors to Tuvalu, but also we are investing in Tuvalu and Tuvaluans' choice to stay at home.
