Introduction

THE STATISTICAL SUMMARY IS PRODUCED ANNUALLY AND REPORTS ON AUSTRALIA'S INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT COOPERATION WITH PARTNER COUNTRIES, MULTILATERAL ORGANISATIONS AND NON-GOVERNMENT ORGANISATIONS (NGOS).

The Australian Government's development cooperation program aims to help developing countries reduce poverty and achieve sustainable development consistent with Australia's national interest. In 2004-2005, the program continued to help build a secure, prosperous and democratic Asia-Pacific region and contribute to global efforts to reduce poverty.

The *Statistical Summary* is produced annually and reports on Australia's international development cooperation with partner countries, multilateral organisations and non-government organisations (NGOs). It provides a range of information at the aggregate level, including geographical and sectoral statistics.

PROGRAM STRUCTURE

The majority of the Australian Government's development cooperation is delivered through AusAID. For this publication, the Australian aid resources managed by AusAID are divided into three main sub-programs: Country and Regional, Global, and Departmental Expenditure.

AusAID's Country and Regional and Global sub-programs are then further broken down into a number of elements: including individual AusAID country programs and regional programs, and AusAID's individual global programs - which deliver benefits across the developing world.

The global programs, in particular, include Australia's financial support for international development organisations; the emergency, humanitarian and refugee programs; Australia's contributions to Non-government organisations (NGOs) and

volunteer programs; and development education, public information, and development research.

AusAID delivered Australian Government aid through this program structure over the period of this Statistical Summary (2002/03 to 2004/05 inclusive). A diagram of the program structure is at Appendix 1.

In addition, Australian development cooperation includes aid activities funded by the *Australian Centre for International Agricultural Research* (ACIAR) and other Commonwealth and State Government departments and agencies. (These organisations also participate in the delivery of many activities directly funded by AusAID.)

These other Government departments (OGDs) are important partners in Australia's whole-of-government approach to development cooperation. This publication provides statistics across all Australian public sector aid, whether funded through AusAID or the OGDs.

CONCEPTS AND DEFINITIONS

The concepts and definitions used in this Statistical Summary are for the most part consistent with the Statistical Reporting Directives of the *Development Assistance Committee* (DAC) of the *Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development* (OECD) and are outlined in Appendix 2.

This publication reports on Official Development Assistance (ODA) and Official Aid (OA) on a cash basis. The distinction between ODA and OA is based on the DAC's List of Aid Recipients. See Appendix 3. A list of abbreviations and symbols is at Appendix 4.

The sectoral breakdown of Australia's development cooperation uses the DAC's sector code descriptions and is an indication of the sector primarily benefiting from a particular activity. All activities, both AusAID's and those managed by OGDs, have been classified according to their DAC sector.

This publication includes information on the ODA/GNI ratio. In 1998, the Australian Bureau of Statistics changed its measure of the amount of national economic activity from Gross National Product (GNP) to Gross National Income (GNI), in line with international standards. Generally, GNI figures are slightly higher than corresponding GNP figures.

COMPARABILITY WITH OTHER DONOR COUNTRIES

Statistics in this publication are stated in Australian dollars and reported on an Australian financial year basis (from 1 July to 30 June of the following calendar year). This may restrict, in some instances, a direct comparison between Australia's development cooperation and that of other donor countries.

Australia reports its development cooperation to the DAC in United States dollars on a calendar year basis to facilitate comparability between donor countries. This includes statistical information at the activity level, which can be accessed through the DAC's web site at http://www.oecd.org/dac.

COMPARABILITY WITH OTHER AUSAID PUBLICATIONS

The methodology for compiling statistical information differs in some instances between this and other AusAID publications, including the Aid Budget Statement and AusAID's Annual Report.

At a macro (or total ODA) level, the data in AusAID's publications match. Due to some divergence in compilation methods and the classification of some activities, there are differences at the detailed level. In addition, the Statistical Summary includes statistics on OA whereas other AusAID publications report on ODA only.

SOURCES OF DATA

The statistical information in this publication is primarily sourced from AusAID databases and is based on data extracted in May 2006. Additional information is sourced from OGDs, NGOs and volunteer agencies. Any revisions made to historical data after May 2006 will be reflected in future publications.

Statistical information on other donor countries' development assistance is sourced from the DAC.

REPORT LAYOUT

The tables and diagrams in this publication are presented in Sections 1 to 4, followed by Section 5, which provides explanatory and technical notes in five Appendices.

Section I provides time series tables covering the financial years from 2002–2003 to 2004–2005. It includes details of Australia's development cooperation by program element, partner country and sector.

Section 2 provides more detailed information on Australia's development cooperation with partner countries in the 2004–2005 financial year.

Section 3 provides supplementary information on various aspects of Australia's development cooperation, including delivery through NGOs and multilateral organisations, and the destinations of Australia's humanitarian, emergency and food aid.

Section 4 provides an overview of all aid to developing countries provided by the member countries of the OECD.

Key statistics for 2004–2005

AUSTRALIA'S OFFICIAL DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE (ODA) TOTALLED \$2,198M IN 2004-2005, \$225M ABOVE 2003—2004. THIS REPRESENTED A REAL INCREASE OF 7.2 PER CENT. THE RATIO OF AUSTRALIA'S ODA TO GNI WAS 0.26 PER CENT.

GEOGRAPHIC FOCUS

Australia's development cooperation continued to focus on the Asia-Pacific region. The main areas were **PNG and Pacific** (\$708m), **East Asia** (\$581m), **South Asia** (\$144m), **Sub-Saharan Africa** (\$83m) and **North Africa and Middle East** (\$46m).

HUMANITARIAN

Australia's humanitarian, emergency and refugee assistance totalled **\$422m**. The top five contributions to partner countries were **Indonesia** (\$78m), **Sri Lanka** (\$31m), **Sudan** (\$23m), **Iraq** (\$22m), and **Afghanistan** (\$19m).

SECTORAL FOCUS

The major sectors of focus were government and civil society (\$478m), other social infrastructure and services, (\$162m), health (\$152m), education (\$120m), agriculture, forestry and fishing (\$135m), and emergency assistance (\$360m).

PARTNER COUNTRIES

The top five contributions of Australian Government ODA to specific partner countries were **Papua New Guinea** (\$350m), **Indonesia** (\$231m), **Solomon Islands** (\$179m), **Vietnam** (\$69m) and **East Timor** (\$65m).

33 per cent of Australia's allocable ODA went to **Least Developed Countries** (LDCs).

MULTILATERAL & NGO FLOWS

The top 5 multilateral recipients were the World Bank (\$287m), Asian Development Bank (\$109m), World Food Program (\$68m), UNICEF (\$33m) and the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria (\$25m)

Australia's development cooperation channelled through NGOs and agencies which mobilise private volunteers to work in developing countries totalled **\$109m**.











DIAGRAM 6.1: PAPUA NEW GUINEA, 2004-2005




DIAGRAM 6.2: INDONESIA, 2004-2005




DIAGRAM 6.3: SOLOMON ISLANDS, 2004-2005




DIAGRAM 6.4: VIETNAM, 2004-2005




DIAGRAM 6.5: CHINA,2004-2005




DIAGRAM 6.6: PHILIPPINES, 2004-2005




DIAGRAM 6.7: EAST TIMOR, 2004–2005




DIAGRAM 6.8: IRAQ, 2004-2005




DIAGRAM 6.9: CAMBODIA, 2004–2005





DIAGRAM 6.10: BANGLADESH, 2004–2005







Appendix 2: Concepts and definitions

Accountable Cash Grants: are a type of funding arrangement where acquitable grants for development activities are paid directly by AusAID to a development partner.

Accrual Accounting: The Australian Government moved to an accrual accounting framework in 1999–2000. As part of this framework, Australian Government expenditure, including AusAID expenditure, is calculated on an expenses basis for internal government budgeting and expenditure purposes.

AusAID Programs (also known as Programs): The Australian Government aid managed by AusAID is delivered through a number of AusAID Programs, which are the major managerial, administrative and accounting framework within which these Australian Government aid funds are deployed. There are three main types of aid delivery program used by AusAID – *Country Programs, Regional Programs, and Global Programs*.

Cash and Expenses: ODA is measured in terms of cash payments in a given time period, rather than expenses incurred over that period. Thus, for ODA statistics, some AusAID expenditure data needs to be adjusted from the expenses basis used in Australian Government financial records to a cash basis.

In particular, adjustments from expenses to cash are required in relation to expenditure to meet major multi-year liabilities such as commitments to the Asian Development Fund and International Development Association. For each financial year, these adjustments <code>exclude</code> the expenses recorded in relation to those commitments, <code>but include</code> the cash paid under those commitments in that year.

Adjustments are also made for items such as movements in creditors and depreciation.

Co-financing: is any arrangment under which a development activity is jointly funded by the Australian Government and a development organisation outside Australia, such as the World Bank, the Asian Development Bank or the United Nations Development Program (UNDP).

Commodity Assistance Program (CASP): provides grants to purchase and import Australian goods for developmental purposes. Constant Prices: These are prices expressed in terms of the price levels prevalent in a chosen base year. The use of constant prices eliminates the effect of inflation on a series of figures, making them directly comparable.

Core and Non-core Contributions: A core contribution is the provision of donor funds to a development organisation without specific conditions as to the use of those funds, so that the organisation can use them for any purpose within its mandate. The funds thus become part of the general financial reserves of the organisation. Non-core contributions are those where the donor specifies any aspect of how the funds are to be used.

Country Programs: AusAID has a separate Country Program for each major partner country, which is planned and implemented jointly with the partner government. Each Country Program is an integrated package of mutually agreed activities, developed and implemented under an agreed country strategy. In dollar terms it is often the largest AusAID program delivering benefits in the partner country.

Current Prices: These are prices expressed in terms of the actual price levels prevalent in the year of expenditure. They state expenditure without any adjustment for inflation, and are sometimes known as nominal prices.

Departmental Expenditure: For any Australian Government Department or Agency, Departmental expenditure is the costs of operating the organisation concerned. Departmental expenditure on aid includes such costs as salaries, equipment costs, rent and other running expenses of AusAID and other official bodies in administering international development cooperation.

Development Assistance Committee (DAC): This is the main committee of the Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) on aid matters, and a key forum of major bilateral donors. The key functions of the DAC are to:

- i. adopt authoritative policy guidance for DAC Members;
- ii. conduct periodic reviews of its Members' development cooperation programs;
- iii. provide a forum for dialogue, exchange and the building of international consensus on aid-related policy and management issues of interest to Members; and
- iv. publish statistics and reports on aid and other resource flows to developing countries and countries in transition and related matters, based principally on reporting by Members.

Direct Aid Program (DAP): an AusAID program which provides aid funds disbursed at the discretion of the (Australian) Head of Mission in a developing country for small-scale development activities.

Expenses and Cash: See Cash and Expenses above.

Global Programs: These are specialised AusAID programs which deliver development benefits across the developing world. They include contributions to international organisations; emergency, humanitarian and refugee programs; contributions to Non-government organisations (NGOs) and volunteer programs; development education and public information; development research; and the International Seminar Support Scheme (ISSS).

Gross National Income (GNI): Under the international System of National Accounts (SNA93) adopted by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS), the measure used to describe national income/product (i.e. the size of the national economy) is *Gross National Income* (GNI). This measure is related to, although not identical with, Gross National Product (GNP). Where relevant in this publication, historical GNP figures have been replaced by the equivalent GNI figure.

Conceptually, Gross National Income is income that accrues to those persons, enterprises and other organisations that are regarded as residents of a country. In arithmetic terms, GNI equals gross domestic product *plus* residents' income from overseas property or productive activity *less* income transferred overseas.

Multilateral Flows: resources channelled via international organisations active in development such as the World Bank, the Asian Development Bank, UN Development Program (UNDP), UNChildren's Fund (UNICEF) and World Food Program.

Non-AusAID Expenditure: covers development cooperation funded by Australian official sector organisations other than AusAID. It includes aid expenditure by the Australian Government's Australian Centre for International Agricultural Research (ACIAR) and other Commonwealth and Australian State Government departments or agencies. It also includes any funding of aid activities by the local government level in Australia.

Official Aid (OA): AusAID will cease to report on OA for financial years after 2004/05. This follows a decision by the DAC in December 2005 that Official Aid should cease to be an official international category for aid flow statistics.

For years up to and including 2004/05, *Official Aid* consists of flows that met all the tests of ODA (see below), except that these flows were delivered in order to benefit countries on what was then Part II of the DAC List of Aid Recipients (see Appendix 3), or to multilateral institutions whose activities primarily benefit Part II countries.

Official Development Assistance (ODA): Official development assistance is defined as *those flows* to countries on Part I of the DAC List of Aid Recipients (see Appendix 3), and to multilateral institutions for flows to Part I aid recipients *which*:

- are provided by official agencies, including state and local governments, or by their executive agencies; and
- ii. each transaction of which:
- a) is administered with the promotion of the economic development and welfare of developing countries as its main objective; and
- b) is concessional in character and conveys a grant element of at least 25 per cent (calculated at a rate of discount of 10 per cent).

Some core contributions to multilateral organisations are only partially reportable as ODA. Examples include contributions to the following UN organisations (with the proportion of the total contribution which can be accounted as ODA expressed as a percentage):

Other Official Flows (OOF): official sector transactions to aideligible countries or organisations which do not meet the ODA/OA criteria, eg:

- i. grants to aid recipients for representational or essentially commercial purposes;
- ii. official bilateral transactions intended to promote development but having a grant element of less than 25 per cent;
- iii. official bilateral transactions, whatever their grant element, that are primarily export-facilitating in purpose. This category includes, by definition, export credits extended directly to an aid recipient by an official agency or institution ("official direct export credits");
- iv. the net acquisition by governments and central monetary institutions of securities issued by multilateral development banks at market terms:
- v. subsidies (grants) to the private sector to soften its credits to aid recipients; and
- vi. funds in support of private investment.

Programs: See AusAID Programs above.

Program Support Units (PSUs): PSUs are AusAID managed work units established within Australian embassies in developing countries staffed by locally contracted personnel (who are not AusAID - or Australian Government - staff). Those work units contribute to AusAID's in-country management of the Australian Government's aid program in the country concerned.

Projects: An aid project is any development initiative financially supported by a donor which has

- a well-defined scope: with clear development objectives, an identified means for achieving those objectives, and defined resources, budget, and start and finish dates, plus
- management and financing arrangements which are additional to local systems, including Partner Government systems. (These additional arrangements can be either completely freestanding, or operate as an "add-on" to local systems.)

Regional Programs (including the cross regional program): These are specialised AusAID aid delivery programs which deliver an integrated program of Australian government activities across a region (or regions) of interest to Australia. Activities are usually planned and delivered under a single regional program strategy, and usually benefit more than one country. For aid statistics, expenditure is allocated between countries of benefit whenever identifiable.

Small Activities Schemes: a traditional type of AusAID small grant scheme, run within individual countries under the supervision of AusAID at the Australian Embassy. It provides small, in-country, grants for development purposes, often to local NGOs and community-based organisations. It is funded from the relevant AusAID Country Program.

The non-farm implicit price deflator: This is a measure of inflation in the non-farm part of the Australian economy.

It provides an index of the overall movement in the prices of goods and services produced in Australia, excluding the farm sector, whether produced for domestic consumption or for export. It is regularly calculated by the Australian Bureau of Statistics.

Technical Cooperation (TC), also known as Technical Assistance (TA):

Technical cooperation/technical assistance can be classified as free-standing or investment-related.

- I. Free-standing technical cooperation (technical assistance) comprises activities financed by a donor country whose primary purpose is to augment the level of knowledge, skills, technical know-how or productive aptitudes of the population of developing countries (i.e. to increase their stock of human capital, and/or their capacity for more effective use of their available factor endowments).
- 2. Investment-related technical cooperation (technical assistance) is defined as the financing of services by a donor country with the primary purpose of contributing to the design and/or implementation of a project or programme aiming to increase the physical capital stock of a developing country. These services include consulting services, technical support, the provision of know-how linked to the execution of an investment project, and the contribution of the donor's own personnel to the actual implementation of the project (managers, technicians, skilled labour etc.).

2004–05 constant price figures are derived using Non-Farm Implicit Price Deflators (IPDs) of Gross Domestic Product provided by the Australian Bureau of Statistics. 2004–05 constant prices are calculated using the formula:

Where p(constant) is constant price

p(current) is current price

d(current) is the Implicit Price Deflator for the year of the current price data

and d(base) is the Implicit Price Deflator for the base year (year of constant price conversion)

Then $p(constant) = p(current) \times d(base) / d(current)$

For example to calculate 1987–88 ODA in 2004–05 constant prices, take the 1987–88 current price (1019.6) and multiply it by IPD for 2004–05 (103.9) divided by the IPD for 1987–88 (64.00) below.

1655.26 = 1019.6 x (103.90 / 64.00)

STANDARD \$US/\$A EXCHANGE RATES

The DAC provides data on ODA expenditure by all OECD member states in \$US terms to allow

- comparision between states,
- the application of standarised statistical measures, and
- aggregation of the data from different member states in relation to geographic areas, sectors and key policy objectives.

For these purposes, and to ensure comparability, all ODA expenditure by member states is converted to \$US relative to a standard set of exchanges rates between the \$US and the currency of each member state. This standard set of rates is determined and published by the DAC.

The standarised \$US/\$A exchange rate provided by the DAC for these international statistical purposes is tabulated below.
