PLAN OF ACTION

FOR THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE JOINT DECLARATION ON MARITIME COOPERATION BETWEEN THE GOVERNMENT OF AUSTRALIA AND THE GOVERNMENT OF THE REPUBLIC OF INDONESIA

I. INTRODUCTION

 The Minister for Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Indonesia and Minister for Foreign Affairs of Australia signed the Indonesia-Australia Joint Declaration on Maritime Cooperation in Sydney on 26 February 2017 ("the Declaration").

II. FUTURE IMPLEMENTATION

- Under the Declaration, Indonesia and Australia committed to deepen and broaden Maritime Cooperation by developing a Plan of Action to support the implementation of the Declaration and its 15 objectives.
- 3. The Plan of Action will become effective upon signing and will cover the time period 2018 2022. Formal review and update on the implementation of the 15 objectives will be conducted in 2020 with a view to renew the Plan of Action.
- .4. In addition, the Plan of Action may be amended within the scope of the Declaration at any time through the written mutual consent of Indonesia and Australia as represented by their nominated contact points at paragraph 6.
- Joint annual progress reports, undertaken at senior officials' level, will be submitted to Foreign Ministers at an appropriate Ministerial meeting to be determined by Indonesia and Australia.
- 6. For the purpose of implementing this joint Plan of Action, Indonesia and Australia have nominated points of contact. Indonesia's point of contact is the Indonesian Ministry of

Foreign Affairs. Australia's point of contact is the Australian Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade.

- 7. Nine focus areas have been jointly determined which encompass the objectives and commitments of the Declaration. The following text outlines for each focus area: proposed priorities for cooperation; and the agencies that have policy responsibility and/or responsibility for delivering a specific activity under that focus area ('implementing agencies').
- 8. Annex contains a matrix outlining the new proposed activities, pending activities, as well as ongoing specific activities against the nine focus areas and priorities for cooperation. This matrix will be used to track progress and complete annual progress reports. It will be updated periodically.
- Indonesia and Australia reaffirm the commitment to develop this Plan of Action and deliver the objectives stipulated in the Joint Declaration against the priority areas of cooperation outlined below.

Economic Development, Maritime Connectivity and the Blue Economy

- 10. Indonesia and Australia recognise the importance of maritime trade and the sustainable development of the blue economy to our collective prosperity.
- 11. Priorities for cooperation may include, but are not limited to:
 - a. Promoting development of improved maritime infrastructure;
 - Collaborative research and activities on the blue economy;
 - Improving regional connectivity including through technical support for multimoda transport connectivity;
 - d. Facilitating increased maritime trade, investment, service and tourism;
 - e. Facilitating technical support for the sustainable development of aquaculture and fisheries in line with international law; and
 - f. Trade facilitation for fisheries products.

- 12. Indonesia and Australia also note the importance of maritime tourism, in particular for the eastern part of Indonesia and the northern part of Australia, and empowering women's participation in economic development, especially in coastal areas.
- 13. Indonesia's implementing agencies under this focus area include the Coordinating Ministry of Maritime Affairs, Ministry of Marine Affairs and Fisheries, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Ministry of Transportation, Ministry of Environment and Forestry, Investment Coordinating Board, Ministry of Research, Technology and Higher Education and Indonesian Agency for Meteorology, Climatology and Geophysics. Australian implementing agencies under this focus area include the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, Department of Agriculture and Water Resources, Bureau of Meteorology, Australian Centre for International Agricultural Research and Austrade.

<u>Strengthen Maritime Security and Combat Transnational Crime Committed at Sea</u>

- 14. Responding effectively to threats on maritime security including transnational crimes committed at sea that require extensive collaboration and cooperation between international partners.
- 15. Priorities for cooperation may include but are not limited to:
 - a. Coordinated patrols;
 - b. Maritime security desktop exercises;
 - Improved capacity building on maritime domain awareness, particularly on maritime security through information sharing, technical training and exchanges;
 - Improved information sharing, communications and workshops, including promoting and strengthening information sharing mechanisms to better combat transnational organised crime committed at sea;
 - e. Increased planning, capability and operational cooperation;
 - f. Conducting regular consultation, dialogue and joint activities aimed at strengthening the links between institutions and officials at all levels; and

- g. Navy-to-navy cooperative activities, including assisting mutual efforts to combat transnational organised crimes committed at sea.
- 16. Indonesia's implementing agencies under this focus area include the Coordinating Ministry of Political, Legal and Security Affairs, Coordinating Ministry of Maritime Affairs, Ministry of Marine Affairs and Fisheries, Indonesian Maritime Security Agency, National Search and Rescue Agency and Indonesian Navy. Australian implementing agencies under this focus area include the Royal Australian Navy, Australian Border Force, and Department of Home Affairs.

Combat Illegal, Unreported and Unregulated Fishing as well as Crimes in the Fisheries Sector

- 17. Indonesia and Australia recognise that illegal, unreported and unregulated (IUU) fishing is a complex and growing problem and are committed to further strengthening bilateral, regional and international cooperation in these areas.
- 18. Priority areas of cooperation may include but are not limited to:
 - a. Cooperation in regional organisations and arrangements focused on combating IUU fishing;
 - b. Working to improve information sharing;
 - c. Strengthening regular dialogues and consultations between relevant institutions and officials at all levels aimed strengthening coordination and information sharing mechanism in combating illegal, unreported and unregulated fishing as well as crimes in the fisheries sector; and
 - d. Explore options for conducting joint capacity building exercise between civilian maritime enforcement agencies.
- 19. Indonesia's implementing agencies under this focal area include the Ministry of Marine Affairs and Fisheries, Coordinating Ministry of Maritime Affairs, Indonesian Maritime Security Agency and Indonesian Navy. Australian implementing agencies under this focus area include the Australian Fisheries Management Authority, Australian Border

Force, Department of Home Affairs and Department of Agriculture and Water Resources.

Improve Maritime Safety and Prevent and Respond to Marine Environment Pollution

- 20. Indonesia and Australia commit to work together to improve maritime safety and to bolster efforts to prevent and respond to environmental threats caused by pollution in the marine environment.
- 21. Priority areas of cooperation may include but are not limited to:
 - a. Training of safety inspectors in port state control to support compliance with international conventions;
 - b. Protecting the marine environment from oil, chemical, hazardous waste and noxious substances;
 - c. Management of solid waste and marine plastic debris; and
 - d. Enhancing cooperation on marine pollution preparedness and response.
- 22. Indonesia's implementing agencies under this focus area include the Coordinating Ministry of Maritime Affairs, Ministry of Marine Affairs and Fisheries, Ministry of Environment and Forestry and Indonesian Maritime Security Agency. Australian implementing agencies under this focus area include the Australian Maritime Safety Authority and Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade.

Improve Search and Rescue Coordination and Disaster Risk Management

- 23. Indonesia and Australia commit to improve search and rescue coordination and communications, enhancing our ability to respond to aviation and maritime incidents in our seas, as well as disaster risk management.
- 24. Priority areas of cooperation may include but are not limited to:
 - a. Promoting capacity building cooperation on search and rescue coordination and operations;

- Exploring further cooperation and coordination on interoperability of search and rescue operations;
- c. Promoting cooperation on maritime meteorology through information sharing and capacity building including cooperation as Regional Tsunami Service Providers under the Intergovernmental Coordination Group for the Indian Ocean Tsunami Warning & Mitigation System (ICG/IOTWMS) on providing tsunami threat information to Member States;
- d. Further strengthen collaboration on the maritime aspects of disaster risk management, specifically around tsunami; and
- e. Review arrangements on the Coordination of Search and Rescue Services between the Republic of Indonesia and the Government of Australia.
- 25. Indonesia's implementation agencies under this focus area include the National Search and Rescue Agency, Coordinating Ministry of Maritime Affairs, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Agency for Meteorology, Climatology and Geophysics Agency, and National Agency for Disaster Management. Australian implementation agencies under this focus areas include the Australian Maritime Safety Authority, Australian Defence Force, Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, Bureau of Meteorology and Geoscience Australia.

Marine Science and Technology Collaboration

- 26. Indonesia and Australia commit to build further cooperation on marine research and work together on marine science.
- 27. Priority areas of cooperation may include but are not limited to:
 - a. Strengthening education and research cooperation in maritime safety and security, sustainable development of the blue economy and addressing marine pollution through cooperation between universities/institutes and collaborative research activities, as well as marine scientific research and capacity building taking into account the protection of genetic resources and traditional knowledge pursuant to the prevailing laws and regulations of both countries; and

- Awards, scholarships and exchanges focused on marine science and technology.
- 28. Indonesia's implementing agencies under this focus area include the Ministry of Research, Technology and Higher Education, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Coordinating Ministry of Maritime Affairs, Ministry of Marine Affairs and Fisheries, Ministry of Environment and Forestry, Ministry of Research, Technology and Higher Education, Agency for Meteorology, Climatology and Geophysics Agency, Agency for the Assessment and Application of Technology and Indonesian Institute of Science. Australian implementing agencies include the Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organization, Australian Centre for International Agricultural Research, Australian Institute of Marine Science, Australian Fisheries Management Authority, Australian Maritime Safety Authority and the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade.

Sustainable Management of Marine Resources and Blue Carbon

- 29. Indonesia and Australia commit to improve the management and sustainability of living coastal and marine resources and to developing a common understanding of coastal blue carbon ecosystems and their ability to sequester carbon.
- 30. Priority areas of cooperation may include but are not limited to:
 - a. Promote regular dialogue and consultation mechanism among relevant institutions aimed at implementing shared commitments in various forums such as:
 - International Partnership for Blue Carbon
 - Cooperation on building the resilience of coral reefs, mangrove and seagrass through the International Coral Reef Initiative
 - Coral Triangle Initiative on Coral Reefs, Fisheries and Food Security;
 - b. Promote capacity building, technical and research cooperation aiming for sustainable management of marine resources and blue carbon;
 - c. Increase dialogue on the access and benefit sharing on the protection of marine genetic resources as well as mitigating the potential risk associated

- with accidents at sea that could affect marine biodiversity with various stakeholders including local communities;
- d. Engage in activities in supporting the establishment of an international instrument on the conservation and sustainable use of marine biodiversity in areas beyond national jurisdiction under UNCLOS and related conventions;
- e. Design and implementation of modern fisheries management;
- f. Cooperation on coral reef condition monitoring and research and development to support increasing the resilience (or restoration) of coral reefs; and
- g. Improving understanding and management of blue carbon.
- 31. Indonesia's implementing agencies under this focus area include the Coordinating Ministry of Maritime Affairs, Ministry of Marine Affairs and Fisheries, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Ministry of Education and Culture, Ministry of Research, Technology and Higher Education and Ministry of Environment and Forestry. Australian implementing agencies under this focus area include the Department of Environment and Energy, Australian Centre for International Agricultural Research and Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organization, the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, Australian Maritime Safety Authority and the Australian Institute of Marine Science.

Maritime Cultural Heritage

- 32. Indonesia and Australia will endeavour to promote cooperation in the area of maritime cultural heritage.
- 33. Priority areas of cooperation will focus on capacity building in maritime cultural heritage.
- 34. Indonesia's implementing agencies under this focus area include the Coordinating Ministry of Maritime Affairs, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Ministry of Marine Affairs and Fisheries and Ministry of Education and Culture. Australian implementing agencies under this focus areas include the Department of the Environment and Energy Australian National Maritime Museum and Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade.

Enhanced Dialogue and Engagement in Regional and Multilateral Fora

- 35. Indonesia and Australia will work together, including in regional and multilateral fora to promote our maritime interests and commitments.
- 36. Priority areas of cooperation may include but are not limited to:
 - a. Strengthening regular dialogue and consultation in the bilateral level;
 - Strengthening regular dialogue and consultation in regional as well as multilateral forum including actively engage in the implementation of IORA Action Plan;
 - c. Annual Navy to Navy talks;
 - d. Regular senior officials meetings between civil maritime enforcement agencies;
 - e. Regular bilateral discussion of maritime issues to build shared understanding and explore areas of common interest;
 - f. Increased engagement through trilateral, minilateral and multilateral mechanisms on maritime issues;
 - g. Strengthening engagement on maritime security in regional and global architecture; and
 - h. Increased cooperation in regional organizations and arrangements.
- 37. Indonesia's implementing agencies under this focus area include the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Ministry of Defense, Coordinating Ministry of Maritime Affairs, Ministry of Marine Affairs and Fisheries, National Search and Rescue Agency, Indonesian Navy and Indonesian Maritime Security Agency. Australian implementing agencies under this focus area include the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, Department of Defence, Royal Australian Navy, Australian Maritime Safety Authority, Department of Home Affairs, Australian Border Force, Australian Fisheries Management Authority and Department of Agriculture and Water Resources.

III. FURTHER ARRANGEMENT

- 38. Funding arrangements for any activity under this Plan of Action will be defined and mutually decided by parties of the said activity.
- 39. This Plan of Action will be implemented within the period 2018-2022 and both sides will conduct annual regular reviews at the senior official level and report to Foreign Ministers at an appropriate Ministerial meeting.
