1.1 PURPOSE OF THE ANNUAL TRAINING PLAN

This Annual Training Plan (ATP) covers the Vietnamese Communist Party Anti-Corruption Training Program (VCPACTP) and is reviewed/updated annually by the sponsor and delivery agencies (PSG and AusAID) in order to ensure continuing relevancy and cost management of the program.

The ATP covers the training schedules and structure of the training cycle for the next twelve months and is aligned to the Australian financial year (July to June). The ATP covers the timings for each of the three training components and describes a range of training options and delivery dates, which require confirmation by the Project Coordinating Group (PCG) – see PMP dated 20 September 2011.

1.2 **PROGRAM OF 2011/2012 TRAINING CYCLE**

The program for the 2011/2012 training cycle is outlined in the following table.

The dates for the delivery of Component One are now fixed, however, the dates for Component Two courses and the Component Three alumni and conference activities are still tentative and will need to be confirmed by AusAID and the PCG.

2. STRUCTURE OF TRAINING COMPONENTS

2.1 TRAINING OUTCOMES/LEARNING OBJECTIVES

The VCPACTP learning objectives are attached as **ANNEX A**. The learning objectives are derived from the Vietnamese Anti-Corruption National 2020 Strategy and the key requirements for the conduct of training as defined in the AusAID Contract dated 8 September 2011 and 2011 Concept Note for the delivery of services.

The learning objectives are identified against each activity in the course programs and will be validated and evaluated through the program by course lesson evaluations and the monitoring and evaluation services for each training cycle. End of training cycle validation and evaluation will be undertaken through the alumni workshops in Hanoi and end-of-cycle evaluation reporting.

2.2 OUTLINE OF COMPONENT ONE

Component One training is currently scheduled for 21 November 2011 - 09 December 2011 which was confirmed at the initial contract and coordination meeting of 16 September 2011 and the PCG meeting dated 26 September 2011.

The program and schedule is outlined in **ANNEX B** and the final schedule will be provided to AusAID twenty days prior to commencement (Milestone 4) for the course.

A preliminary key date prior to the training (Milestone 4) is the delivery of the final training program for the course not later than 20 October 2011, however, we do not anticipate any significant changes to the program attached at ANNEX B (agreement was reached on the program at the PCG meeting dated 26 September 2011 with the PI, OSCAC and GI)

It is currently envisaged that component one training will likely be the first activity in each training cycle and will in later years be scheduled for the September and October periods.

2.3 OUTLINE OF COMPONENT TWO

Component two training for the 2011/2012 training cycle is restricted to the delivery of only one operational based course of two weeks. This is composed of a one week component in Vietnam and one week in Australia.

Training programs for the following training cycles will need to be carefully considered based on the rotation and types of personnel attending. For example, the Party Inspectorate personnel are not involved in investigative procedures and case management yet OSCAC and GI are heavily involved in these issues. Consequently, the selection of participants will need to be carefully managed to ensure relevancy and capacity development value.

The following table reflects some of the scheduling and overall sequence of the thematic and operational courses, but this will also depend on outcomes from the component three workshops and key gaps/issues identified from the component one courses as well as identified by PSG from participation of roundtables leading to the Anti-corruption Dialogue of Vietnam in November 2011.

A detailed course program is attached as **ANNEX C** and specific details of each activity will be confirmed at the PCG meetings and in the training program delivered 20 days prior to the course (Milestone 5).

2.4 OUTLINE OF COMPONENT THREE

Component Three of the training is comprised of two elements covering an international conference delegation and a workshop for the previous course alumni at the end of the training cycle of each year. For the 2011/2012 training cycle the following program is proposed:

- a. **ANNEX D** covers eight international conferences considered suitable for the VCPACTP. PSG recommends a selection of two possible conferences (only one to be selected), each with a specific focus on anti-corruption issues.
 - i) Priority One Germany (January 2012)
 - ii) Priority Two UAE (January 2012)
 - iii) Priority Three Russia (March 2012)

The recommendations are based on relevance and value. It is worth noting that the conference proposed for May in the Netherlands is also ideally suited. Importantly, the training cycle for conferences is based around a January/February and a October/November course program (this is traditionally when the conferences are programed). The key anti-corruption and relevant governance conferences in Australia do not commence until the third and fourth quarters of 2012. It is likely that we will recommend the NSW IPAA anti-corruption and investigators conference in Australia, which is currently proposed for November 2012, however, this will depend on the types of participants and overall skills and experience requirements.

b. The second element of component three training is the alumni workshop, which is proposed to be undertaken over a period of three days in Hanoi. This is currently proposed for the period late May 2012 and further details on program, structure and agenda will be coordinated 30 days prior to the workshop.

ANNEX B - COMPONENT ONE TRAINING

OVERVIEW OF COMPONENT ONE TRAINING FOR 2011

The attached program of training covers the delivery of Component One as part of the VCPACTP. The course designed to assist high-ranking officials engaged in policy and strategy development to support the objectives of the Communist Party's anti-corruption strategy to 2020.

The course will be conducted from 21 November to 9 December 2011 and is to be undertaken in the following stages:

- 1. Vietnam Training 7 day course in Hanoi (includes weekends)
- 2. Australian Training 12 day course covering the following stages (includes weekends):
- 3. 5 day course and visits program in Canberra
- 4. 2 days of visits in Sydney
- 5. 3 days of visits in Melbourne

VIETNAM COMPONENT

The Vietnam component seeks to orientate participants to the current status of Vietnam's policy and legislative frameworks as well discussing the progress towards the achievement of the 2020 national strategies. The program seeks to provide participants with an appreciation of the challenges in implementing an effective anticorruption policy framework, along with the key requirements of the international conventions and performance standards for compliance.

A key feature of the Vietnamese training component will be a facilitated activity involving the Party Inspectorate which is intended to guide participants in developing organisational anti corruption implementation plans and frameworks. The planning process will involve participants undertaking a SWOT analysis of each organisation's portfolio and core service areas will then assist participants to identify specific anti corruption implementation challenges.

AUSTRALIAN COMPONENT

The Australian component will enable participants to examine Australia's anti corruption institutions, frameworks and systems for preventing and fighting corruption. Students will be encouraged to critically analyse the Australian experience and incorporate this analysis into their own anti corruption implementation plans.

TRAINING OUTCOMES

Component One training has been designed for participants to develop an appreciation and understanding of the national integrity systems and factors, which contribute to corruption. Key learning outcomes for the course are described in the following Table.

ANNEX C – COMPONENT TWO TRAINING

OVERVIEW OF COMPONENT TWO TRAINING PROGRAM FOR 2012

The attached program of training covers the delivery of Component Two as part of the VCPACTP. The course is designed to assist officials in charge of operationally focussed anticorruption areas/sectors so that they can apply specific knowledge to their work area to support the objectives of the Communist Party's anti-corruption strategy to 2020.

The course is proposed for 12 March 2012 to 23 March 2012 and is intended to be undertaken in the following stages:

- 6. Vietnam Training 5 day course in Hanoi
- 7. Australian Training 5 day course covering the following stages:
- 8. 2 day course and visits program in Canberra
- 9. 3 days of visits in Melbourne.

VIETNAM COMPONENT

The Vietnam component will orientate participants to the current status of Vietnam's policy and legislation frameworks as well as discussing the progress towards the achievement of the 2020 national strategies. The program seeks to provide participants with an understanding of the requirements of international frameworks and to gain an appreciation of the challenges of implementing effective anti corruption systems into the law enforcement environment.

A key feature of the Vietnam component will be a facilitated activity involving the Party Inspectorate designed to guide participants in developing individual anti-corruption implementation plans. This planning process will involve participants undertaking a SWOT analysis of different areas/sectors that will assist in identifying specific anti corruption implementation challenges. Participants will then identify the knowledge from the training topics and other assistance from available experts they require to design implementation plans.

AUSTRALIAN COMPONENT

The Australian component will enable participants to examine Australia's anti corruption institutions, frameworks and systems for preventing and fighting corruption. Participants will be encouraged to critically analyse the Australian experience and incorporate this analysis into Vietnamese anti corruption implementation plans.

TRAINING OUTCOMES

This training has been designed for participants engaged in law enforcement to develop an appreciation and understanding of the national integrity systems and factors contributing to corruption. Key learning outcomes from this course include corruption prevention and investigation techniques and are outlined in the following Table.
